#### Michigan 4-H license plate now available!

Michigan drivers have a new way to show their 4-H pride while supporting 4-H youth development programming: through the purchase of the newly released <u>Michigan 4-H</u> license plate. Available at the Michigan Secretary of State, the plate prominently displays the signature 4-H clover and part of the proceeds from every sale and renewal will go to support Michigan 4-H youth.

"We are elated that the Michigan 4-H license plate is officially here," said Quentin Tyler, director of Michigan State University Extension, which is home to the Michigan 4-H program. "We hope the many members of our Michigan 4-H community –youth, parents, alumni and supporters – will consider supporting 4-H by purchasing a plate as they renew their licenses this year."

Similar to other special cause fundraising license plates in the state, the Michigan 4-H license plate will cost \$35, with \$25 of the purchase fee benefiting Michigan 4-H Youth Development. A \$10 fee will also be charged to benefit Michigan 4-H when the plate is renewed. License plates may be ordered by visiting Michigan.gov/sos, by mailing in a form or scheduling a visit to any Secretary of State office. The plate will be delivered by mail in two to three weeks.

#### Michigan 4-H Foundation opens 2024-25 grant cycle

Awarded annually, the Michigan 4-H Foundation recently opened their grant and award opportunities for the 2025-2026 season. Open to 4-H volunteer leaders, members and staff, the grants and awards support local 4-H clubs and county programs. **All applications are due June 1.** 

"County 4-H programs and clubs have so many unique programs," said Abbey Miller, director of the Michigan 4-H Foundation. "Thanks to the support of our generous 4-H donor community, we are pleased to offer mini-grants to support these many wonderful programs."

Opportunities include:

- Michigan 4-H Legacy Grants of \$1,000. These grants are awarded to support development of a new program or initiative or to strengthen, enhance or expand a current program that is making a difference.
- **4-H On-Target Grants of \$500.** These grants support 4-H Shooting Sports programs to enhance existing programs, develop a new program or offer a special experience related to 4-H Shooting Sports.
- The Collins 4-H Youth Horticulture Grant of \$500. This grant is available only to 4-H youth clubs and supports advancement of club work in plant science and horticulture activities.
- **4-H Educational Garden Grants of \$1,000.** These grants support the creation of local 4-H educational gardens in Michigan.

## How to be an involved 4-H parent in 10 easy steps – Step 8: Make 4-H a family activity

Your child has joined a 4-H club, now what? Try these tips to help make your 4-H experience a family activity.

Let's start by clarifying there is no such thing as "easy" when it comes to being a parent. Parents play an important role in 4-H programs by supporting and encouraging their child throughout the 4-H experience, in much the same way they would advocate for the child through school, sports or other activities. Being an informed and supporting parent can enhance your child's 4-H experience to ensure they receive maximum benefit from the program. This article is part of a series that will provide a number of tips for 4-H families to bolster their 4-H experience.

## Step 8: Make 4-H a family activity

Through your family's 4-H experiences so far, you may have recognized a few common themes that are core to the 4-H program: 4-H programs provide learning, 4-H members do volunteer service and 4-H programs are fun. You may have also noticed 4-H can take up a portion of your family's time.

Have you considered making 4-H an activity you do as a family? Making 4-H a family activity will not only help your child's development, but may also help strengthen your family.

<u>Michigan State University Extension</u> has published a number of articles highlighting the six characteristics of a strong family, as identified in the University of Nebraska's "<u>Family Strengths Research Project</u>:"

- What makes a family strong?
- <u>Qualities of a strong family</u>
- Is your family strong?

These articles, in addition to "<u>Spending quality family time together is very important</u>," acknowledge the importance of families spending time together. These articles give a few examples of quality family activities.

The 4-H program was <u>founded</u> on the basis of young people learning and experimenting with new agricultural techniques, which were later adopted by their parents. As we progress into the rapid changing technologies we face today, young people are still at the forefront of early adoption with older generations lagging behind. Making 4-H part of your family's quality time can provide an opportunity for you to enjoy hands-on learning experiences *with* your child. Your willingness to learn together sends a strong message to your child that learning is a life-long process.

Another 4-H activity you could pursue as a family to set a positive example is volunteering. When you volunteer your time and talents as a family, it helps your child understand the importance of being a contributor toward a healthy community and instills a deep-rooted culture of volunteerism.

The <u>MSU (Michigan State University)</u> Extension article, "<u>Three critical life skills children can gain through</u> <u>family volunteering experiences</u>," describes skills you can help your child gain through the experience. The <u>Points of Light</u> organization provides additional information on the benefits of volunteering and resources to help you plan your family's volunteer effort, including participating in <u>Family Volunteer Day</u>, which occurs this year on Nov. 18, 2017.

Your family's 4-H journey can provide your child with an unlimited number of learning encounters. Whether your journey is just getting underway or if your family has been involved in 4-H for years, you are likely to find something new to learn and experience at every step along the way. You will find there are people along the path to help guide you, but ultimately the path of your family's 4-H expedition will be individually determined.

#### Strengthen your 4-H club

Strengthen your 4-H club by using the experiential learning model and engagement with 4-H members.

One of the goals of the 4-H program is to help youth develop <u>life skills</u> that can be used to navigate in a complex and changing world. Youth involved in 4-H can experience a sense of belonging, build positive relationships with others, and develop their spark. Strong and healthy 4-H clubs provide a great environment for this and for helping youth to foster life skills.

One way to strengthen 4-H clubs is to focus on utilizing the <u>experiential learning process</u>. The experiential learning process consists of three specific parts: doing the experience, reflecting on the experience and applying the experience. Youth engage better in experiences that focus on "learning-by-doing" activities. As 4-H clubs use this model and learn together, individuals will acquire life skills and <u>assets</u> that will help them develop into successful adults. These can include skills such as self-discipline, <u>problem solving</u>, goal setting and teamwork; all of which are valuable skills.

Looking for more ways to strengthen your club? Here are ten suggestions from <u>Michigan State University</u> <u>Extension</u>:

- 1. Spend time with the 4-H members and do fun and educational activities together as a 4-H club.
- 2. <u>Plan</u> ahead with members so everyone knows what to expect.
- 3. Establish a balance between project activities, club meetings, community service and fun.
- 4. Listen carefully to understand each member's viewpoint.
- 5. Show consideration and appreciation. Celebrate your club.
- 6. Develop pride in your club. This could be through club shirts, signs, notes, folders or some other youthgenerated idea.
- 7. Help each other and be willing to let others help you.
- 8. Connect with other 4-H clubs and plan programs together.

- 9. Take part in county, regional and state 4-H activities.
- 10. Give back to your 4-H program and the community.

MSU Extension has also created other resources with <u>tips and tools</u> to help clubs evaluate how they are doing as a 4-H club. It doesn't hurt to do a self-reflection every few years to make sure your 4-H club is strong and thriving.
