Important Auction Tax Reporting Update

Beginning January 1, 2026, the IRS requires a **1099-MISC** to be issued when a youth earns **\$2,000 or more in total proceeds from the sale of project animals during a calendar year**. Recent federal legislation increased the reporting threshold from **\$600 to \$2,000**.

Isabella County 4-H, Michigan State University Extension, the Isabella County Fair Board, and Livestock Producers are currently working to understand the requirements and determine the process for collecting any necessary information from exhibitors and families. Compliance with these reporting requirements is important for all auction programs.

We are continuing to learn more about this process and will share additional information and instructions with families as soon as they become available. Thank you for your patience and understanding as we navigate this new requirement together.

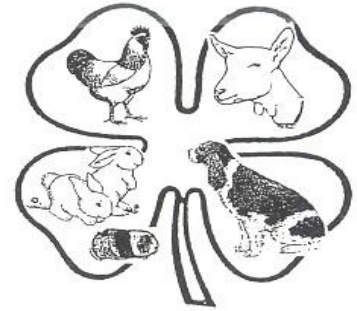

All clinics are held in the Small Animal barn at the fairgrounds, from 6:30 PM – 7:30 PM.

****Clinics will be cancelled if temperatures reach 85 degrees or higher, it is a good idea to plan to attend the earliest available date. We will post on Facebook no later than 3 PM if we have to cancel.**

- Poultry Members - to continue keeping the fair birds safe of Avian Influenza, NO live birds will be brought to the clinics. We will utilize fake birds to teach showmanship.
- Rabbit members ages 8 - 19 should come to as many clinics as possible -- there is a lot to learn in a short amount of time and we usually have several kids at a table with one person helping. These are not one-on-one teaching sessions. If you do not yet have the rabbit showmanship guide, contact the MSU Extension Office and have the steps roughly learned before the clinics, as that will be much easier to understand the instructors. Also, each individual rabbit member 8 - 19 years old will need to do a final verification of fair class information and auction choices with the rabbit superintendent at one of the last three clinic dates listed, please plan accordingly.
- If you plan to sell your rabbit, chicken or goat at the fair, you **NEED** to register for the Small Animal Auction. There will be a message box that pops up **AFTER** submitting sign-up for small animals. Click on the link in the box to sign-up for your small animal auction project.
- If members/leaders have any questions, please reach out to the species-specific superintendent. Educational information and other details/reminders will be available to clinic attendees. We highly encourage members to attend at least one of the clinics so there are no surprises at fair check-in. Because clinics will be cancelled if temperatures reach 85 degrees or higher, it is a good idea to plan to attend the earliest available date. That also gives time for solving any issues that may be noted when animals are seen at the clinics.
- Cloverbuds are welcome to attend if they choose, but because they are not judged and our teens do their evaluation, these clinics are not geared towards 5 - 7 year olds. There will be a lot of instruction and special one-on-one teaching during fair week specifically designed for this age group.

Dog Classes for Fair Competition

Bring dogs, leash and treats. Youth must wear tennis shoes. Youth are **required** to attend at least eight classes each in obedience, showmanship and agility to compete at the fair this year.

There are a few things to take note of:

- There will be a message box that pops up AFTER submitting sign up for Small Animals. Click on the link in the box to sign up for your Small Animal Auction project.
- There is a separate form for the Cloverbud (5-7 year olds) craft section. Cloverbuds are not allowed to sell in the Still Exhibit Auction.
- You will get a “receipt” from Google following your registration to the email that you used to sign up. If you do NOT receive an email within 24 hours of your sign up, contact Kapre at kaprefilhart@gmail.com to make sure that your sign up went through. ALL sign ups are due June 13 at 10 PM. There will be no exceptions.
- You will need to know which project you plan to sell for the Still Exhibit Auction upon signing up (crafts sign up AND auction form due on June 13!). There is a second section under each still exhibit department that will allow you to indicate whether or not you wish to sell a project from that section. You are still only allowed to sell ONE item for still exhibit auction. You will need to know which exhibit you are selling at the time of sign up. Cloverbuds are not allowed to sell still exhibits.

4-H Award Information

Outstanding 4-H Member & Chet Brown Applications Available

Applications are now being accepted for this year's Outstanding 4-H Member and the Chester Brown Memorial Leadership Development Award. Applications are available on the MSU Extension website at: https://www.canr.msu.edu/isabella/isabella_county_4_h/newsletters-and-forms or at the Extension office. Completed applications are due at the Extension office by July 15. Eligibility requirements are as follows:

Outstanding 4-H Member

(winner will be selected to receive \$500 towards CWF Trip, National Club Congress Trip, or scholarship towards higher education)

1. Applicants must be 15 years of age (by January 1, 2026).
2. Completed three calendar years of 4-H club work.
3. Completed 4-H projects in at least two project areas.
4. Been recommended by local leader.
5. Applicants will be interviewed on Friday of fair week.

Chester Brown Memorial Leadership Development Award

1. Applicants must be 13 years of age (by January 1, 2026).
2. Applicants should demonstrate leadership abilities in an activity. This activity should not be eligible for fair exhibition. Examples of eligible activities: community service project, school related activity, church activity.
3. Selection will be based upon organizational skills, number of people participating, and how they were involved.
4. Applicants will be interviewed on Friday of fair week.

Other 4-H Award Opportunities - you must sign up for these on your fair entry form:

4-H Jr. Teen Leadership Award - Ages 10-12

1. Enroll in the 4-H junior leadership project with club leader and 4-H office.
2. Complete the self-reflection form with your 4-H leader.
3. Complete two or more junior leader activities (see application for suggestions)
4. Display a poster (28" x 22") at the fair depicting some aspect of your project.
5. Be interviewed by a fair judge.

4-H Teen Leadership Award - Ages 13-19

For all 4-H members who have enrolled in a teen leadership project and completed it prior to the beginning of fair week. Must complete a poster (28"x22") and evaluation form available from the Extension office. Two \$50 cash awards are given.

Junior Achievement Booth Award - Ages 12-14

Showcase your participation in 4-H with an Achievement Booth at the fair. Guidelines and suggestions are available from the Extension office. One winner will be selected and will receive a choice of: \$125 towards a trip to Washington, DC (WOW - Wonders of Washington).

Senior Achievement Booth Award - Ages 15-19

Here is your opportunity to highlight your 4-H participation. Guidelines are available from the Extension office. One winner will receive a choice of: \$300 toward a trip to CWF (Citizen Washington Focus) in Washington, D.C. next summer; National Club Congress held next November in Atlanta, Georgia; or scholarship towards higher education.

(Registration: 8:30 – 9:30 AM, Safety meeting: 9:30 AM, Shooting begins: 10 AM)

June 27 - County Shoot

(Shooting begins at 9 AM, youth must attend one qualifying shoot in order to compete at the county shoot)

****New this year - 3D scheduling, registration begins at 8 AM, head out at 8:30 AM for all qualifying shoots**

Pre-registration is required for ALL shoots!

Youth must pre-register to the Extension Office what disciplines (BB, Air Pellet, .22, Archery, Shotgun, Muzzleloading) they are going to participate in.

4-H Shooting Sports Age Policies:

- 4-H Shooting Sports Programs are open to young people aged 8 through 19. The “4-H age” will be determined by a young person’s age as of January 1 of the 4-H program year.
- Members age 8 may participate in BB gun, basic archery and 3-D archery. Participation is at the discretion of the Certified Instructor and the participant must be under direct adult supervision (one on one).
- Cloverbuds (4-H ages 5 - 7) must wait until they reach the 4-H age of 8 to participate in shooting sports.
- Members ages 9 – 11 are limited to shooting Air Pellet, BB & archery at competitive events
- Youth must attend one qualifying shoot in order to compete at the county shoot

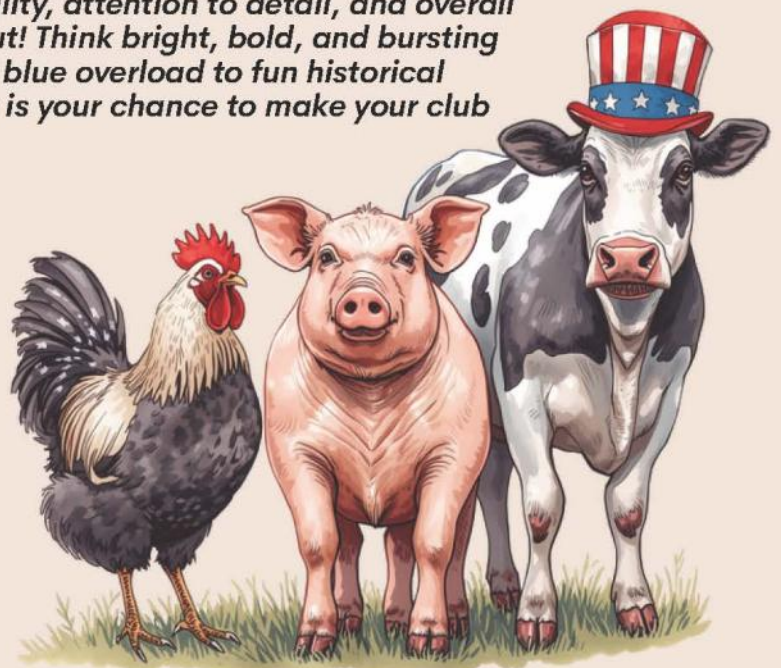

The day will include both individual and team competition with classes of beef cattle, Boer goats, sheep and swine.

Contest divisions include:

- 4-H Juniors - 4-H youth ages 8-13 as of January 1
- 4-H Seniors - 4-H youth ages 14-19 as of January 1
- FFA Junior High - FFA members that recently completed seventh or eighth grade
- FFA High School – FFA members that recently completed grades 9-12
- MLE - Youth ages 8-21 as of January 1 that are not a member of 4-H or FFA
- Cloverbuds - 4-H youth age 7 as of January 1, non-competitive

While the dates for the contest no longer coincide with Michigan Livestock Expo (MLE), this contest does still count as an educational experience for the MLE Premiere Stockman Award.
