Cooking Matters for Parents

MSUE strives to make accommodations for all, including visually impaired, "it was very helpful with my disability. You gave me a job each week that I was able to do and felt like I was a full participant in the class, often times I'm just sitting while everyone else does the work in group settings like these. Sending the recipes out before class so she could review them at home with her technology assistance prior to class and allowing the friend to join was a big help".

Fair Accommodations

Although we have always made accommodations for individuals while exhibiting, this year we hired a judge that specialized in interviewing individuals that would need or want accommodation while interviewing with their static projects. This allowed self-identified youth a relaxing area and time to share their learning and pride in their projects. In addition, we had parents request assistance for their youth showing livestock. Comments from parents: “As an advocate for children with special needs community, I am so pleased to hear of your addition of judging accommodations. Thank you very much, you calmed my worries as a parent as well.”



Three’s Not a Crowd in Lenawee Co Project Red

In 2024, the partnership of LISD, MSU Extension and Farm Bureau successfully reached every 4th-grade classroom in Lenawee County, engaging 1,045 students. Over two days, students attended four hands-on educational stations, each lasting 1.5 hours.

Sessions Offered:

- R Group:** Small Animals, Horse Care, Horticulture, Hearing Protection.
- E Group:** Fire Safety, Ag Commodities, Bees & Pollinators, Beef, Sheep & Swine.
- D Group:** Sheep Shearing, Dairy Production, Drones, Watershed/Wetlands.

Health and Nutrition School Program

There was something special going on in room 9 at Michener Elementary School this fall. Every Monday and Friday, classrooms of 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade students would file into the room where only tables were arranged with pencils and workbooks.

"Welcome friends! Quickly find your spot, please, and get ready for our high-speed handwashing. We have much to do today!" exclaimed the Michigan State University Extension Community Nutrition Instructor. After all hands were scrubbed, the next instruction came. "Table A - I invite you to practice MISE EN PLACE. Please come to the supply table and collect the supplies and ingredients for today's recipe." It was at this point that a quiet 3rd grade girl asked to share something. "I told my family all about *mise en place*. Now my grandma says I am to help her with our Thanksgiving meal." When asked how she felt about that, she explained, "I feel really excited! I never get to cook at home, but now they say I know more about cooking, and they are proud of me." It is a special opportunity to witness another's growth and achievement in building life skills. It is even more remarkable to witness the development of another's self esteem and place of value in a family. We can only hope that this student's journey with food continues to create a healthy and fulfilled life for her and her family.

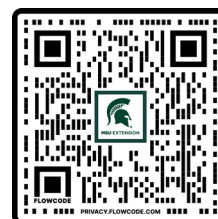
