Fair Registration Process

All fair registrations MUST be submitted by **4PM on July 1st**. Please make sure you are registering all family members before clicking the submit button.

Tips for Exhibitors Making Online Entries:

Recommended browsers: Google Chrome or Mozilla Firefox. Older versions of Internet Explorer may cause unexpected behavior. Register all entries for each exhibitor in the family before proceeding to the Payment section. There will be no charge for 4-H Entries. Be sure to click the "Submit" button when you have completed your entries. Entries are not final until they have been submitted. Check your email inbox for a confirmation email with a list of your entries.

Exhibitor Entry

1. You may access the Lenawee 4-H fair from <http://lenaweecounty4h.fairentry.com> or go to www.Fairentry.com and Click "Find your Fair".
2. Filter by State, click search, and then click on 2026 Lenawee County 4-H Fair.
3. If you have a 4Honline family account, select to "Sign in with 4Honline" and enter your login information. **NOTE:** If you forgot your password for your 4HOnline account, you need to go to 4HOnline to set a new password. Then use the new password (not the temporary password) to log in to FairEntry.
4. If you do not have a 4HOnline account contact the 4-H office at 517-264-5300 for assistance.
5. Click "Begin Registration"



Step One – Entering Exhibitor Information

Check to make sure exhibitor information is correct, especially addresses! Click edit and adjust if it not.

Step Two– Creating Entries for Exhibitors

- Click "Add an entry" beside the correct exhibitor.
- Click select beside the first department you wish to enter.
- After you select a department, you will see a list of divisions to select from, and then a list of available classes. *Also notice that there are blue "Change" links in case you mistakenly select an incorrect department, division or class.*
- After you have selected the class, click the green **Choose** button.
- At this point you will continue on with the Multiple entry process.
- Click *Change* to select the club to which these entries will be associated.
- If this is an animal entry, click "Add animal" and enter the animal's details. If you are selecting a market animal, make sure you select the tag Number that corresponds with that animal!
- Select which animals will be part of this entry. These animals will be available for this exhibitor to use in other entries if needed.
- If it is a static projects, simply select the classes that you would like to create for this exhibitor. Click Continue.
- Review the entries. If you need to make any changes, click cancel. If everything is correct, click Create Entries.
- If you need to add another exhibitor, click on the exhibitors button at the top left and repeat the steps to create a new exhibitor.
- If you need to add more entries for an existing exhibitor, click "Add an entry".



Submitting Entries

- Review your entries for completeness and accuracy. *Notice the Summary and Detail buttons at the top of the list on the right.* If there are errors, click on the green entries section at the top of the page. Click Continue when all information is correct.
- Once all entries have been entered for exhibitors in your family, submit the invoice for approval.
- You will receive an email message when the entries have been submitted for approval.

4-H Youth Projects



Welcome to the 4-H Division of the Lenawee County Fair!

- Questions regarding the 4-H Division should be directed to the MSU Extension 4-H Office, 1040 S. Winter St., Adrian. 517-264-5300.
- Premium amounts listed are subject to change by the Lenawee County Fair Board.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

- A. Exhibitors in the 4-H Departments & Divisions must follow guidelines established for 4-H exhibition. All projects displayed shall be the work of the exhibitor & finished during the current 4-H year (Sept. 2025 to July 2026)
- B. Youth Exhibitor age is their age on January 1st of the current year. Youth between the ages of 5 -7 as of January 1st are eligible to exhibit under the Cloverbud dept. Exhibitors ages 8-19 will exhibit in the 4-H Division. All exhibitors in the 4-H division must belong to a 4-H club or FFA chapter recognized by the 4-H program in Lenawee County. FFA members may exhibit in the 4-H department, but must follow all guidelines. Exhibitors who are 4-H and FFA members may only exhibit one entry per class except where noted.

ENTRIES

Deadline for registration of ALL YOUTH DIVISION ENTRIES is July 1st, 4PM.

- All entries are confined to the listing of classes in the Fair Premium Book. All static projects will be judged and placed on exhibit prior to or at the time of judging as indicated on the judging schedule.
- **All members will register through an online entry process through fairentry.com.** If you are a registered 4-H member, log in using your 4honline email and password. If you are a FFA member and not enrolled in 4-H online you will need to complete an online profile. See Page 2 for fairentry.com instructions or contact the 4-H office.
- Refer to listing of classes in the Fair Premium Book. Each entry must be identified by Department, Division, and Class Number.
- Livestock exhibits are to be brought into the fairgrounds at the times listed in specific sections. Please see those sections to be sure your animals are in on time.
- When entering classes for group or club exhibits, displays, performing arts acts, etc. have one member complete only one entry.
- Superintendents have the authority to request

exhibitors to remove their exhibits and forfeit their premiums due to poor care of exhibit, illness or dangerous behavior.

- Livestock projects will be released at 10:30 pm on the last Saturday of Fair. Static projects will be released on Sunday between 1:00 – 3:00 pm
- Fair is not responsible for projects left after 3:00 pm on Sunday. No premiums will be paid for exhibits removed prior to release time with the exception of exhibits released for showing at other events on Fairgrounds.

PROTESTS

Protests must be made in writing and submitted to Londa Pickles, MSU Extension Fair committee chairperson, within 10 days from the time of alleged infraction. Any exhibitor may file a complaint regarding any of the following:

- a. Conflict of interest of the judge.
- b. Disqualification of an exhibit or exhibitor.
- c. Exhibitor, group leader, or superintendent behavior.
- d. Eligibility of the exhibit.

All protests will be considered at a time set by committee chairperson and all interested parties will be notified. If the individual filing the complaint is not satisfied with the actions resulting from their original complaint, the exhibitor filing the complaint may make an appeal to the Michigan Department of Agriculture's Fair department within 45 days of filing the initial complaint. The department shall have 60 days after receipt of any appropriately filed appeal to investigate the complaint, and shall issue a finding of fact and notice of department action and any recommended action for the association. In the event that any protest requires tests or incurs other costs to verify, the protester will pay for any finding proving infraction of these rules.

4-H EXHIBITOR WRISTBANDS

4-H members are admitted free, with official wristbands, provided by the Fair. Removal of wristbands will only be authorized for athletic practices or employment. 4-Hers will need to obtain a permission slip from the 4-H Office to be filled out and signed by coach or employer. This slip plus your cut off wristband must be presented to gate personnel.

PROJECT RECORD BOOK

LEARNING OBJECTIVE

Develop the ability to set goals, design & carry out a plan of action for a project, summarize, & self-evaluate. Project Record Books are available online or by contacting the MSU Extension 4-H Office.

Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Feeder, Goats, Poultry

All 4-H & FFA livestock project members are encouraged to enter a Project Record Book. The purpose of this competition is to encourage record keeping as a good business practice. Unless noted in specific departments/divisions, Project Record Books are optional.

Record Books will be judged on the following scale:

The final market weight used to determine market price will be based on the animal's weight at weigh-in.

4-H YOUTH LIVESTOCK & SMALL ANIMAL DEPARTMENTS

GENERAL RULES

1. All cattle, goats, bison, sheep & swine are required to have official identification. See Michigan Department of Agriculture Health Requirements for Livestock Exhibited. <https://www.michigan.gov/mdard/animals/exhibitions>
2. Any other tests required will be stated by specie.
3. All livestock exhibitors must be in compliance with animal health requirements as defined by the Michigan Department of Agriculture. For a complete copy of these rules contact the MSUE 4-H Office or go to <https://www.michigan.gov/mdard/animals/exhibitions>
4. Only approved normal feeds & water for animals may be used. Any use of other unnatural substances may be brought to the attention of the superintendents and may be cause for the animal to be eliminated from both show and sale.
5. All exhibitors will be expected to abide by barn rules posted in animal areas.
6. All hay, grain and straw must be provided by the exhibitor. Bedding will not be provided by the Fair Board. The Cloverbeat Blast newsletter will have information if

any 4-H based barns decide to provide bedding.

7. No championships will be awarded unless there is competition and unless the judge feels winners are worthy of championship.
8. Every article or animal upon the Fairgrounds will be under the control of the Fair Board and every precaution will be taken for the safekeeping, but the Len. Co. Agri. Society will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur, and upon this condition only will entries be received.
9. All market livestock projects must be owned by the exhibitor.
10. Any medication must be brought to the attention of the superintendent before being administered.
11. Superintendents reserve the right to spot check animals.
12. DECISIONS IN EACH DEPARTMENT FINALIZED BY THE SUPERINTENDENT (S) RESPONSIBLE.

CLUB DISPLAYS – BEEF, SHEEP, SWINE

1. All clubs and FFA are automatically entered in Club Displays.
2. Purpose of this contest is to promote and exhibit the livestock industry and products to the general public.
3. Exhibit may be three dimensional or flat depicting some phase of the livestock industry.
4. Exhibit in place no later than 3 p.m. Monday.

HERDSMANSHIP

Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Feeder, Goats, Horse & Pony

- A. All clubs and FFA groups are automatically entered in the HERDSMANSHIP project.
- B. This project is intended to encourage youth and club pride in the proper care and exhibiting of livestock.
- C. All participants will be judged on a daily basis as described below:
 1. Attitude and conduct of members - club spirit, cooperation, willingness to work, and attitude toward other club projects exhibits and youth.
 2. Condition of Animals - clean, well-groomed animals, properly stalled.
 3. Condition of Stalls - clean, neat stalls and walkways.
 4. Proper identification and displays.
- D. Judging will begin upon arrival and close when exhibits are released.



SHOWMANSHIP

Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy, Dairy Feeder, Goats, Poultry, Horses and Rabbits

- A. Pre-fair registration for showmanship is required for all livestock, and the animal must be registered for a market or breeding youth class to be shown by that member.
- B. All entrants in animal classes must personally care for, fit, & show their own animals.
- C. Members with four (4) years or less experience in project may need coaching to do their best. Appropriate help may be sought from Lenawee County 4-H members, club leaders or parents/guardian. Exhibitor must be involved.
- D. **NO** professional fitters.
- E. Age is determined by 4-H age as of January 1 of current year.
- F. Awards will be determined on the basis of:
 - 1 Fitting of animals
 - 2 Training of animal
 - 3 Showmanship of exhibitor
 - 4 Attitude demonstrated by exhibitor
 - 5 Knowledge of project
- G. Any 4-H or FFA exhibitor may participate in showmanship classes with their own animal.
- H. Everyone will compete in their age bracket.

CHAMPION SHOWMAN SWEEPSTAKES LAST SATURDAY OF FAIR - Show Barn and various locations - 11AM

(Need not pre-register for Champion Showman)
Champions of Beef, Sheep, Swine, Dairy, Dairy Feeder, Goats, Horse, Draft Horse, Rabbits, and Poultry Showmanship will be eligible. Contestants will show eight (8) species of livestock. Highest combined score will be the winner. Champion Showman Banner & Trophy

JR. LIVESTOCK, SMALL ANIMAL, DAIRY FEEDER

Exhibitors' Auction checks will be available at a Fall open house. Exhibitors are required to provide copies of their Thank You cards/letters to all contributors (buyer & add-ons) to their project and a W-9 if check is \$2,000 or more.

Guidelines:

1. A gift, basket, or other item given to the buyer in the Show Barn immediately after the Auction does not qualify as the Thank You card/letter.
2. All contributors (buyers & add-ons) need to be sent a Thank You card/letter. Check with the 4-H Office if you need more information.
3. A copy or picture of your Thank You card/letter must be sent to the 4-H Office.
4. Poultry and Rabbit exhibitors also need to have the Delivery Slip signed and turned in.
5. Each Thank You card/letter needs to include the Buyer's name and the exhibitor's name to be recorded correctly.
6. The person picking up the check will have to sign for the release of the check.
7. **Checks must be picked up and cashed with in 60 days.**

STATIC ENTREPRENEURSHIP AUCTION CHECKS

Exhibitors' Auction checks will be available at the MSU Extension office. Please check the Cloverbeat Blast newsletter for the check pick up date. Exhibitors are required to provide copies of their Thank You to the Buyers.

Guidelines:

1. All contributors (buyer & add-ons) need to be sent a Thank You card/letter. Check with the 4-H Office if you need more information.
2. A copy or picture of your Thank You card/letter can be sent to the 4-H Office or Project Superintendent.
3. Each Thank You card/letter needs to include the Buyer's name and the exhibitor's name to be recorded correctly.
4. The person picking up the check will have to sign for the release of the check.
5. **Checks must be picked up and cashed within 60 days.**

JR. LIVESTOCK & DAIRY FEEDER ANIMAL DRUG POLICY

Jr. Livestock and Dairy Feeder Calf Associations reserve the right to drug test fair animals under the Industry Act, Act 466 of 1988, as amended, in Section 40(3). Exhibitors are responsible for their animal from time of purchase through marketing. By registering to show your animal(s) at the Lenawee County Fair, you are authorizing the Jr. Livestock and Dairy Feeder Calf Associations the right to drug test your animal(s). An independent lab will run the necessary test. Jr. Livestock and Dairy Feeder Calf Associations are responsible for the cost of the initial test. If a positive reading is received, the individual is then responsible for the cost of the second test. With two (2) positive results, the Jr. Livestock and Dairy Feeder Calf Associations reserve the right to disqualify any animal, either live or slaughtered, found in violation of the use of drugs, and/or chemicals. Disqualification will result in voiding of the placing(s) of the animal(s) in question; forfeiture of any and all ribbons/trophies/special awards; an assessment of a fine equal in amount to the total sale; and disbarment of the exhibitor from exhibiting at the Lenawee County Fair Jr. Livestock and Dairy Feeder Calf Shows for a period of three (3) years. Other animals will not be moved up in placing.

- A. To participate in each individual auction, all published deadline dates, registration requirements, rules & regulations must be met.
- B. All Market Grand and Reserve Grand, and Champions must sell.
- C. Each 4-H board will determine the methods, time and place for the selling of the market animals sold at the Lenawee County Fair.
- D. Exhibitor will be allowed to sell one lot in each auction. Exception: Jr. Livestock auction, if an exhibitor has a second animal in the barn where they are Grand and/or Reserve Grand champion, they will be allowed to sell the additional animal from that barn.
- E. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to care for and feed their animals the entire week of fair. Improper care may result in animals being sent home and forfeiture of premiums.
- F. No sick animals will be sold.
- G. To be eligible for auction, all animals must have been entered and shown in their respective market classes.
- H. Each association reserves the right to charge a per head stalling fee for market animals to go to 4-H Barn and Show Improvement funds. The fee will be deducted from the exhibitor's auction check, no matter what specie the participant sells.
- I. Each exhibitor is required to sell their own project.
- J. Exhibitors wishing to withdraw an animal from an Auction must notify the superintendents in charge of that project area at weigh in.
- K. Exhibitors selling animals will be required to pay a percentage of their sale price to help cover expenses.
 - Small Animal: 5% of the sale price.
 - Dairy Feeder: 2% of the sale price.
 - Jr. Livestock: 2.5% of the sale price.
- L. Exhibitors are required to provide copies of their Thank You cards/letters to all contributors (buyers & add-ons) to their project. See Livestock Auction Checks on page 7.
- M. All exhibitors are welcome to serve refreshments and help with other duties at the auction, but the following are required. **Check in and out is required.** If you are unsure if you must serve, please check at the refreshment table during the auction. If exhibitor does not fulfill required work duty, exhibitor will forfeit \$25.00 from check.
 - **Small Animal & Dairy Feeder:** The auction sale orders are determined by a random draw. This year if the exhibitors sale order number is an even number, then exhibitors are required to serve

refreshments or other assigned duties during the auction for 10 minutes. Small Animal Exhibitors please check your back tag for time to serve. Dairy Feeder Exhibitors will serve 10 minutes after selling, after returning their calf to the barn.

- **Jr. Livestock:** The auction sale order is determined by a random draw. This year, if the exhibitor's sale number ends with either a 5 or 0, then exhibitors are required to serve refreshments or other assigned duties during the auction for 15 minutes.

Small Animal Auction – the auction will include all meat rabbits, meat type chickens, ducks, geese, turkeys, and goats. Only meat pens will be sold. No C Pens can sell.

Dairy Feeder Calf - Milk from the Dairy Department will be sold during the Dairy Feeder Calf Auction. A member involved in both Dairy Feeder and Dairy, must notify both department superintendents which project area they will be receiving auction money from. Exhibitors are not allowed to sell a Dairy Feeder Calf as well as receive auction money from the Dairy Milk Sale. Any exhibitor in the overweight class will sell their animal for the maximum weight of 600 pounds. At weigh-in, Exhibitors will determine if they are selling. Based on Market price, exhibitor can withdraw from auction up to 5PM Tuesday.

Jr. Livestock – Arrangements can be made through the Jr. Livestock Association for animals to be shipped direct. Due to limited processing appointments, animals that go through the auction will take precedent. If spots are available, ship directs will be filled in. A **\$10.00 per head** shipping fee will be assessed to cover expenses. You must notify superintendents in your specie area at weigh in if animal is to be shipped direct.

NEW REQUIREMENT THIS YEAR – IRS Guidelines

To ensure we are following current IRS regulations, please note the following update: If a "seller" earns \$2,000 or more in total proceeds from the sale of project animals within a calendar year, the IRS requires that the exhibitor be issued a 1099-MISC form. If an exhibitor receives \$2,000 or more in combined auction proceeds, they will need to complete a W-9 form before their check can be released. We appreciate your cooperation in helping us meet these federal requirements. If you have any questions about this updated policy, please contact the 4-H office.



Step by Step Guide of the Small Animal Auction

The below information is a step-by-step guide to assist members through the Small Animal Auction. If you have any questions, please contact Small Animal Superintendents, Board Members or the 4-H office.

1. Set Up will begin at approximately 3:00 p.m. in the Sale Barn. Help is needed.
2. Poultry exhibitors must pick up their auction number tag between noon and 4:00 on the day of the auction.
3. Rabbit and Goat exhibitors must pick up their auction number tag at 4:00 p.m.
4. All exhibitors will be told what time to report to the 4-H Center to be lined up and sent to the Sale Barn.
5. The auction sale orders are determined by a random draw. This year if the exhibitors sale order number is an even number, then exhibitors are required to serve refreshments or other assigned duties during the auction for 10 minutes. Small Animal Exhibitors please check your back tag for time to serve.
6. **STAY IN LINE** when you reach the Sale Barn. It will not be a very long wait.
7. Some varieties of animals will be kept in the Sale Barn for multiple exhibitors to use during the Auction. This helps protect the health of all 4-H project animals. Check with your Superintendent prior to Wednesday to see if your variety will already be available. If you have a specific breed not represented or a goat, you will need to bring your animal with you.
8. After animal is sold, leave animal with the Board representative and go with the teen leader to thank your buyer.
9. Thank the Buyer, give them their rosette/banner, and step back to the edge of the aisle and wait for the teen leader to get the information from the buyer.
10. Take the animal destination slip to the Animal Destination table and wait for further instructions.
11. Saturday when animals are released please check with Superintendents regarding the destination of your market pen. If poultry and rabbits are to be processed and delivered to the buyer or charity it is your responsibility to have this done by date on checkout slip.
12. You must have the buyer or charity representative sign the Delivery Slip (supplied to you at fair check out). This form must be mailed to the designated location by the designated date, in order to receive your auction check.
13. Youth must show a copy of Thank You card/letter to the Buyer in order to receive their auction check.

- H. Aged Cow – 100,000 pound cow, any cow, any age, with official lifetime credits over 100,000 pounds of milk as of show day. Cow must be accompanied by DHIA records or official pedigree. Entries in this class are not eligible for other classes.
- I. The club or school herd will consist of three females from at least two exhibitors. Only one entry permitted per club.

REGISTRATION & TAGGING

- A. All calves must have been purchased, tagged, registered and full body picture showing markings and DFC tag submitted by **April 15th** and under the care of the 4-H member in order to show and sell. Two tags are required: Dairy Feeder Calf Association and a Radio Frequency Identification (RFID).
- B. A maximum of two (2) calves tagged per exhibitor regardless of dual membership in 4-H and FFA. When tagging two calves, both must be in the same location at all times.
- C. **Swing Calf** – Each dairy feeder project member in the family is required to tag one calf in their own name. One additional calf can be tagged under all the dairy feeder project members in their immediate family (brothers/sisters). If a family is unable or chooses not to tag a back up or swing calf, and something happens to a tagged animal, the exhibitor can request from the DFC board to tag a new animal, but the DFC board reserves the right to have the exhibitor show in the over/under weight class and is not eligible for championship.

GENERAL RULES

- A. There will be a mandatory meeting Saturday night after weigh in.
- B. First and Second year Dairy Feeder Calf Exhibitors are required to attend one educational workshop offered by the Dairy Feeder Calf Association. All other members are encouraged to attend.
- C. All calves must be from American dairy breed animals, or a cross of these breeds. The 6 American breeds are as follows: Guernsey, Brown Swiss, Ayrshire, Holstein, Jersey and Milking Shorthorn. **No cross breeds** with any beef type or other dairy breeds are allowed. Final decisions will be at the discretion of the superintendents and/or veterinarians.
- D. **Steer calf only.** No bulls or stags will be permitted.
- E. Animals must be castrated no later than May 1st of the current project year. No Clamping Allowed. Castration sites must be completely healed and dry at time of weigh-in.
- F. Animals must be dehorned no later than May 1st of the current project year. Dehorning sites must be completely healed and dry at time of weigh-in. Maximum 1 ½" re-growth allowed (measured from the base) or calf will be turned away.

- G. **If you do not show in your market class, you will not be allowed to sell.**
- H. If exhibitor is unable to show their own animal in market class, the exhibitor must notify the superintendents **prior to the class**. Anyone assisting an individual in showing, must be a Lenawee County 4-H or FFA member.
- I. Any special circumstances can be brought in front of the DFC Association Board.

CHECK-IN, HEALTH CHECK & WEIGH-IN

- A. All animals are to be in Dairy Barn between **5:00 pm** and no later than **8:00 pm** on the first Saturday of fair. Clubs will be assigned times to bring calves in. No animals are allowed in the barn unless checked in by the Superintendent or Veterinarians. Proof of vaccination form must be signed and turned into the Superintendents at time of weigh-in.
- B. Implants are allowed.
- C. All animals must pass MDA animal health standards. For a complete copy of these rules please contact the MSUE 4-H Office or go to <https://www.michigan.gov/mdard/animals/exhibitions>
- D. Calves must weigh a minimum of 300#, and may not exceed 600# at the time of weigh-in. Calves that are over or under will be allowed to weigh one additional time, within 30 minutes of the initial weigh in. No forcing of fluids or in-humane activities to change weight of calf. After the reweigh: If an animal weighs under 300# but over 285#, animal will show in the over/under weight class and not eligible for market championship. Calf is eligible for auction but if DFC Board is unable to secure a resale buyer, exhibitor will be required to take animal home and forfeit market price. If the calf weighs more than 600#, animal will show in over/under weight class and not eligible for market championship. Animal is eligible for auction but will be sold for the maximum weight of 600#.

BARN & PEN CLEANING RULES

- A. It is the responsibility of each youth for the care and feeding of their animal for THE ENTIRE WEEK OF THE FAIR. Improper care will result in the animal being sent home and the forfeiture of premiums.
- B. Water must be in front of calf at all times.
- C. Pens will be checked by Project Superintendents and/or Association Board members on a daily basis for cleanliness.
- D. All stalls should be cleaned and soiled bedding removed by 10:00 am
- E. If the pen is not clean, it will be tagged by the Project Superintendents. If the pen is tagged the exhibitor must check in with the Project Superintendents.
- F. Daily logs will be kept on these issues by the Project Superintendents.
 1. The first offense will result in a verbal warning (signature required).



2. The second offense will result in a notification of their parent/guardian and a PENALTY FEE of 5% of their auction money (signature required). This money will be forfeited to the Lenawee County Dairy Feeder Calf Association.

3. Each additional offense or failure to check in with a Superintendent will result in a PENALTY FEE of an additional 10% of their auction money. This money will be forfeited to the Lenawee County Dairy Feeder Calf Association.

G. On a daily basis, clubs will be assigned common cleaning areas to maintain; around manure spreader, main aisle, and wash rack area. Clubs can earn extra points in herdsmanship if assigned areas are kept cleaned throughout the day and evening.

- L. All market animals will have a minimum weight of 900 lbs.
- M. All rate-of-gain animals must have been tagged and registered by January 15, current year, with the MSUE 4-H office and weighed in and registered at the fair grounds at the designated rate of gain weigh in. \$5.00 per head to enter rate of gain, due at rate of gain weigh in. Individual can only place with one animal.
- N. All over and underweight cattle will be sent home unless it is the exhibitor's only beef project. If so, animal will be allowed to stay and be shown in showmanship only.

EXHIBITORS:

- P. **All exhibitors must have an updated Youth for Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) certificate to exhibit.**
- Q. Members may tag three(3) market steers (Holstein & Beef), two (2) Market Heifers and two(2) feeder calves.
- R. If a youth has two animals in the same class, the member must show one and the other one must be shown by a Lenawee County 4-H or FFA member or move the heaviest animal up one class.
- S. Exhibitors may enter one (1) animal for sale at the Jr. Livestock Auction, unless you have Champion or Reserve Champion, then you may sell one addition Beef Project. Determination must be made at time of weigh in. If member does not designate which animal, the heaviest animal will be sold.
- T. If an exhibitor is unable to show their own animal in market class, the exhibitor must notify the superintendents prior to the show. Anyone assisting an individual in showing, must be a Lenawee County 4-H/ FFA member.
- U. There will be a **\$10.00** per exhibitor pen fee for barn cleaning and barn improvements. This will be deducted from the exhibitor's sale check, no matter what specie the exhibitor sells.

BEEF FEEDER CALF RULES

- A. Beef-type (heifer or steer) calves must weigh 300-600 lbs.
- B. Must be purchased by June 1, current year & they must be in member's possession, tagged & registered with the MSUE 4-H office.



- I. All market lambs must weigh a minimum of 85 lbs. in order to show and sell. Any lamb under 85 lbs. will be sent home. No reweighs.
- J. Exhibitors must notify the barn superintendent, at weigh in if they are selling their animals or not in the auction.

GENERAL SHEEP RULES

Violation of rules may result in premiums, awards and/or sale money withheld.

- A. No sheep can be removed without superintendent permission.
- B. Humane practices at all times.

1.No domestic abuse including; hitting, clenched fist hitting, punching or back slapping of any sort is allowed in or outside of the lamb barn and showing. If done, it could result in removal for the lamb barn and could be asked to leave the showing at any given time.

2. Absolutely no lamb is to be left unattended on a halter or lamb stand at any time. Failure to comply, the superintendent has the right to remove you from the barn

- C. No forced liquid feeding, drenching or bottle feeding. If done, there will be zero tolerance, you will be immediately removed from the barn.
- D. No Muzzles.
- E. Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to the breeding, age, ownership, and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. Unethical fitting shall include the following:
 - 1. The cutting, tearing, or gluing of the hide or underneath the hide or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the shape of the animal.
 - 2. The injection of any gas, solid, liquid under the hide to alter the normal conformation.
 - 3. Any attempts to disrupt or change the normal dental development of the animal.
 - 4. Any attempt to change or alter the natural color of the animal.
- F. Lambs must be castrated before June 1st. Any signs of viable or functional tissue will result in disqualification.
- G. Market lambs must be shorn prior to the fair. Electric Clippers will be permitted for trimming only. A complete "slick shear" can take place on the Fairgrounds on a fleece of 1/4" or less. The trimming/shearing area must be cleaned up immediately. Youth, parents or leaders are the only ones allowed to use clippers on the Fairgrounds. No professional fitters.
- H. Youth exhibitors must be clean, neat and appropriately dressed while showing.
- I. Lamb is to be shown with all four feet on the ground or ring surface, after the lamb has been set. (This is at the judge's discretion)
- J. If a youth has two animals in the same class, the member has the right if they so choose to move the lamb up a class if a class is available.
- K. If an exhibitor is unable to show their own animal in market class, the exhibitor must notify the superintendents prior to the show. Anyone assisting an individual in showing, must be a Lenawee County 4-H member or FFA member.
- L. Champions will be selected in the following order: Grand Champion Wether, Reserve Champion Wether, Grand Champion Ewe, Reserve Champion Ewe, Grand Champion Pen, Reserve Champion Pen. The Grand and reserve ewe and wether will be eliminated from the final pen drive. Pairs cannot be reconfigured after Champion and Reserve Champion selection. **All Champions must sell.**



BARN & PEN CLEANING RULES

- A. The exhibitors will be responsible for the care and feeding of their animals through Saturday when the animals are released or exhibitor will forfeit premiums.
- B. Feeding times 7-9AM and 5-7PM
- C. Feed buckets in pens only during feeding times. Once feeding time is over feed buckets must be removed.
- D. Water must be available in pens at all times except 12 hours prior to show.
- E. No Carpet – Must use natural bedding such as wood shavings and/or mulch.
- F. Washing of animals must occur at the designated wash rack.
- G. **Lambs MUST be in or around sheep barn at all times.** Lambs are not to be in camping, parking or other barn areas, with the exception of pictures at the photo display by the pig barn.
- H. Pens will be checked by Barn Superintendents daily for cleanliness.
- I. If pens are not clean or if feed buckets are left in they will be tagged by the Barn Superintendent. If the pen is tagged the exhibitor must check in with a Barn Superintendent.
- J. The first offenses will be a verbal warning.
- K. The second offenses or failure to check in with a Barn Superintendent will result in the exhibitor receiving a PENALTY FEE of an additional 10% of their auction money. The money will be forfeited to the Jr. Livestock Association.
- L. Each additional offense or failure to check in with a Superintendent will result in the exhibitor receiving a PENALTY FEE of an additional 10% of their auction money. The money will be forfeited to the Jr. Livestock Association.
- M. Daily logs will be kept by the Superintendents. If an exhibitor receives a second offense their parents/guardians will be notified.
- N. Jr. Livestock Association - Sheep Barn Improvement will charge a \$10.00 per head, stalling fee to go to Sheep Barn Improvements. The fee will be taken from the participants Auction check, no matter what specie the participant sells.

- A. No sheep is eligible unless the exhibitor has had the sheep in possession since May 1 of current year. Exhibitors registered in both breeding and feeding (market lambs) may show in both exhibits.
- B. All animals are required to have a USDA Scrapie Identification Tag.
- C. The date for computing the age of sheep is September 1st.
- D. All sheep must be purebred, except when showing in the crossbreed class.
- E. Pair of lambs may consist of two ewes or one ewe and one ram.

- F. Pen consists of 4 animals, both sexes represented.
- G. Get of Sire, consist of 4 sheep, any age of either sex all from one sire.
- H. The club flock will consist of one ram, one aged ewe, two yearling ewes and two ewe lambs. The flock must be owned be at least one or more youth from one club, may be one or more breeds.
- I. Individual flock shall consist of one ram under 2 years old, two ewes 1 year old and two ewe lambs.
- J. Not more than one entry may be made by a club in the flock class in each breed.
- K. Pair, pen and flock classes must be entered and shown as individuals.
- L. Exhibitors in 4-H breeding are encouraged to enter the open class sheep division as well.

- A. All goats will be checked in on Saturday July 25, from 5-6AM Board members Only. 6-8AM ALL others
- B. Number of goats allowed per exhibitor may be limited due to barn overcrowding and will be at the superintendent's discretion. All goats MUST BE HOUSED in 4-H GOAT BARN in order to show.

- E. In addition to official tags and/or tattoos, any out-of-state animal must have current veterinary health certificate. A copy must be submitted at vet check-in.
- F. Any goat with a temperature over 104 degrees or goats with clinical signs of infection, that is contagious, has any abscesses or toxicological disease must be removed from the fairgrounds— ALL DECISIONS WILL BE MADE BY CHECK-IN VET AND SUPERINTENDENTS.
- G. Any kids born after June 15th of current year, will not be allowed to show or enter 4-H Goat Barn (due to health considerations).
- H. Barn meeting following check in on **Saturday, 8AM**

REGISTRATION & ID


- A. All goats must be officially identified to exhibit. Goats must have one of the three official identifications:
 1. Official USDA Premise ID Tag – (white metal or plastic scrapie tag)
 2. Legible Official Tattoos accompanied with a copy of

ADGA, ABGA or NPGA Registration Papers. Microchips may be used in registered Pygmy goats. Microchip reader must be available entire fair week & exhibitor is responsible for that. The microchip number must be printed on the registration certificate not written in.

3. **LAMANCHA ONLY**– Per state guidelines may be identified with permanent collar and Premise ID tag.
- B. Inside of ears must be clipped in order to read tattoos.
- C. All breeding class animals must be in the possession and under the care of the exhibitor by May 15 of current year, except those born to your herd after that date

GENERAL GOAT RULES

- A. **MANDATORY WORKSHOPS** - All first year goat exhibitors are required to fulfill mandatory educational requirements of one educational workshop and one showmanship clinic.
- B. Exhibitors may show **ONE** goat per class.
- C. No bucks of any age allowed in goat barn.
- D. Prong collars will not be allowed, except for breeding and market Boers
- E. All exhibitors must personally care for, fit and show their own goats.
- F. Only one pair of goats may be shown by exhibitor in Mother/Daughter class. These goats must also be shown in age classes.
- G. All goats used for showmanship, goat calling, obstacle, and dress a goat classes **must also be shown** in a breed, meat, or cart class. **No extra goats will be allowed in goat barn.**
- H. Goats owned by one exhibitor cannot be shown by another, except at the discretion of the superintendents.
- I. No horns or scurs over 1 1/2" will be allowed except Angora, Pygmies, and Boer Breeding and Cart Goats. Scurs will be measured.
- J. All fitting and trimming must be completed **BEFORE** goats arrive at the Fair. NO electric clippers will be allowed inside or outside the goat barn. Goats brought through the vet check unshaven will remain unshaven through fair week or goat will be disqualified from showing.
- K. Any exhibitor not acting in a responsible manner will be asked to leave the fairgrounds and will forfeit their right to show and their premium.



BARN DUTIES

- A. **Mandatory Barn Set-Up** – All exhibitors must report to goat barn **Saturday, July 11th at 8:00 am**. If unable to attend, you must notify a superintendent and **will lose \$25 of premiums**.
- B. All daily milking and feeding chores must be done between the hours of 6:00 – 9:00 am and 6:00- 9:00 pm.
- C. On Show Day, All milkers must be milked out between 5:00 - 9:00 am and the exhibitor **MUST** report to the superintendents. Kids may be left on dams after milkout, if desired. If exhibitor is not able to be present for milkout, he/she **MUST** notify superintendents before. If no milkout is completed, goat will be disqualified from showing.
- D. Pen cleaning must be completed by 10:00 am daily. Unclean pens will be tagged. If your pen is tagged see one of the Superintendents ASAP. Evening cleaning if necessary must be approved by Superintendent.
- E. **MANDATORY BARN TEAR-DOWN** - All exhibitors with the **last initial K-Z MUST** report to goat barn on Sunday, AUG 2 by 8:00 am. Exhibitors removing goats from barn Sat., Aug 1, after evening release time **MUST RETURN** Sunday morning for Tear-Down. All chores, including milking chores, must be completed before 8:00 am. Tack boxes and goats must be removed by that time in order to clean pens and tear down barn. Those not returning on time will forfeit all premiums and be charged a \$25.00 per pen tear down and cleaning fee.
- F. All exhibitors must sign up for two shifts of barn duty or one shift at the Steak Shack.
- G. All ID cards and pen decorations must be hung by 7:30PM Saturday July 25. No decorations can be removed until after 10PM August 1st.
- H. There will be a sign-in for chores, milking and pen cleaning. Please sign in each day!

REGISTRATION & TAGGING

- A. Market hogs must tagged and registered by May 15th. Photos of tags in animals' ears must be submitted at time of registration.

- B. All exhibitors must follow established registration, tagging guidelines and tag documentation photo. Exhibitors may tag swine entries by family (immediate only). Example, if you have two youth in the family, all hogs can be tagged under both the exhibitors names. A maximum of five(5) hogs tagged per exhibitor regardless of dual membership in 4-H and FFA. Exhibitors must declare entry per member at weigh in.
- C. Each registered 4-H and/or FFA member may show up to three market hogs regardless of dual membership in 4-H and FFA. To be eligible to exhibit three market hogs at least one must be a purebred.
- D. If exhibiting two or three hogs, registration must be made in Section 2 Class 1(crossbred Market Hog) and Class 2 (Purebred Market Hog). If selling 2 or three market hogs, they will be sold as a pen.
- E. All exhibitors must have an updated Youth For the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) certificate to exhibit.

CHECK-IN

- a. Pigs will be brought in on Sunday, but ALL swine exhibitors must verify pen assignments by 3:00 pm, Saturday with Superintendents.
- b. All swine exhibits must be brought in between 5:00 am and 8:00 am, Sunday. Soiled or dirty hogs will be directed to the wash rack prior to pen assignment. Approved swine will be unloaded at the North door and will be taken directly to their pen assignments.
- c. Exhibitors who elect the option to take their animals home and not offer them for sale must advise the Jr. Livestock Swine Board representative in writing prior to unloading.
- d. Market animals will be weighed only once. This weight will be used to determine show classes and sale weight. All weights are final.
- e. Swine will be weighed in as directed by superintendents. Weight between 220 pounds and 290 pounds will be eligible for weight classes and the Junior Livestock Auction. Swine below 220 pounds and over 290 pounds can show in showmanship but will NOT be eligible for the Market Class or Junior Livestock Sale. Animals that do not make weight can be shipped to approved slaughter house at the end of the fair. All shipping arrangements will be made by Jr. Livestock Board Members.
- f. Purebred registration papers with the exhibitors name shall be presented to the superintendents at weigh in. All other hogs will be placed into weight classes with all barrows competing and all gilts competing in separate classes. If participant is showing two barrows or two gilts they will show in two separate classes.
- g. All hogs must have a minimum of ½" of hair. All hogs will be checked for hair length at weigh in. At the superintendents discretion, hogs that have been clipped to less than ½" of hair on any portion of the body will be disqualified from showmanship, market class, and shipped to market. No clipping of swine will be allowed on the fair grounds.

GENERAL SWINE RULES

- A. The swine show and auction will be non-terminal. Exhibitors who wish to take their project home and NOT offer their swine in the Jr. Livestock Auction must advise the Swine Board in writing prior to unloading. Arrangements to remove non-terminal swine from the fairgrounds after the fair, need to be coordinated with the Jr. Livestock Board. All Champions must sell.
- B. Animals found to contain testicles or any other conditions which deems the animal lacking a quality carcass will be replaced by the Jr. Livestock Board at the expense of the exhibitor. The funds for this action will be withdrawn from the exhibitor's sale check.
- C. All decisions of adult superintendents are final.

SWINE BARN RULES

- A. Jr. Livestock Association - Swine Barn Improvement Committee will charge a \$10.00 per head, stalling fee to go to Swine Barn Improvements. The fee will be taken from the participants Auction check, no matter what specie the participant sells.
- B. Feeding times are **5am – 9:00 am** and **5:00 pm – 7:30 pm**, daily.
- C. Feed pans are only allowed to be left in pens during designated feeding times and must be attended at all times. Waters that are hung on gates need to be mounted and secured in a fashion that does not damage the gate.

- A. ALL exhibitors must work **2 feeding details** (Barn Duties) in the barn during fair week. Check-in with Barn Superintendent or a Board Member is a must. 4-H member is responsible for checking to make sure name is stamped to show completion of barn duty.
- B. Waterfowl exhibitors must do **4 feeding details** (Barn Duties) during fair week. Check-in with Barn Superintendent or a Board Member is a must. 4-H member is responsible for checking to make sure name is stamped to show completion of barn duty.
- C. Please see a superintendent to make any changes to your barn duty time and/or date.
- D. Failure to fulfill these rules will result in a penalty fee of an additional 10% per each barn duty missed of your auction money (or premiums if not selling in the auction) to be forfeited to the Small Animal Association.

PEN CLEANING RULES

- A. Pens must be cleaned daily by **12:00 noon**. Pens will be checked by Barn Superintendents daily for cleanliness.
- B. If pens are not clean they will be tagged with a note to "See Barn Superintendent" by the Barn Superintendent. If the pen is tagged the exhibitor and parent must check in with a Barn Superintendent and both are required to sign book.
 1. The first offense will be a verbal warning.
 2. The second offense or failure to check in with a Barn Superintendent will result in the exhibitor receiving a **PENALTY FEE** of an additional 10% of their auction money (or premiums if not selling at auction). The money will be forfeited to the Small Animal Association. The exhibitor will also be assigned responsibilities as delegated by a Superintendent.
 3. Each additional offense or failure to check in with a Superintendent will result in the exhibitor receiving a **PENALTY FEE** of an additional 15%, 20%, 25% etc. (as the number of offenses or lack of check in occurs, the penalty increases) of their auction money (or premiums if not selling at auction). The money will be forfeited to the Small Animal Association.



AUCTION

- If you do NOT want your birds used Auction night you must tell a Superintendent the day of judging.
- All exhibitors who sell in the Small Animal Auction, whose Buyers chose to have their birds processed or sent to charity, will be responsible for processing and delivering to the Buyer or the designated Charity by the date specified.
- If 4-H member fails to check in at all check points, 4-H member will be scratched from auction. (1st check point – 4-H Center; 2nd check point – entrance of sale barn)
- **Entries must be processed by a licensed processor.**

CHECK—OUT

- Release Time: 10:30 pm-12, Saturday the last day of fair.
- **No Sunday Check—Out.**
- All birds not picked up by 11:59pm, Saturday, the last day of fair will become property of the Small Animal Association.
- Exhibitors must clean pens before leaving fairgrounds, failure to do so will result in a \$25.00 Fee.
- Any exhibitor who removes their project from the Poultry Barn prior to the scheduled check out will lose 25% of their auction money, and their premiums.
- All exhibitors must check out with a Superintendent upon being released from the barn. If you sold a market project, make sure you pick up your buyer information.



CHECK-IN, HEALTH CHECK, & WEIGHING

ALL Rabbits Check in: Friday, July 24 6:30 –8:30 pm Rabbit Barn

- All rabbits shall be tattooed prior to health check.
- Health Check – No rabbit will be allowed in rabbit barn before undergoing health check. Any rabbit with clinical signs of infection, contagious or toxicological disease shall be removed from fairgrounds immediately.
- All market rabbits must be weighed in.
- Weigh in for market rabbits will be done at check in where exhibitors will be given a weigh in slip or slips.
- Weigh in slips shall be brought with you for market judging.
- Copies of Pedigree papers for market rabbits must be submitted at time of weigh in.
- Each rabbit shall have its own pedigree, this means if you have a fryer pen you will have three separate pedigrees. Pedigrees shall be signed by the exhibitor only, pedigrees with other than exhibitors name will not be accepted.
- Pedigrees for Breed Classes must be available on day of judging, except first year members showing in Fancy or Commercial Breed judging.
- NO pregnant rabbits may be checked in.

REGISTRATION & TATTOO

- All exhibitors must follow established registration and identification guidelines.
- All rabbits must be officially identified to exhibit. Rabbits must have identification tattoo.
- Meat rabbits must be tattooed and registered with the MSU Extension 4-H Office by established deadlines.
- Roasters registered by **May 15**; may register up to three (3) per exhibitor. *May bring a maximum of 2 pens.*
- Fryers registered by **June 18**; may register up to nine (9) per exhibitor. *May bring a maximum of 2 pens (6).*



GENERAL RABBIT RULES

- A. All entries are limited to breeds listed in Fancy or Commercial breeds.
- B. Rabbit exhibitors are **limited to (7) seven pens** of their choice with up to two in the same class for Division numbers 1-2. Meat classes will be allowed two pens in each class of roaster and fryers. Premiums will be paid on four money classes.
- C. Exhibitors must be pre-registered to participate in all classes they want to show.
- D. Exhibitors must be present when their rabbits are being judged unless prearranged and approved in writing by a Rabbit Superintendent.
- E. Only first year exhibitors may show a crossbred rabbit in the Fancy Breed or Commercial Breed judging. Although it is strongly recommended that you purchase a pedigreed rabbit. All other exhibitors must have pedigreed rabbits to show, this applies to all classes.
- F. Rabbits will be judged by ARBA Standards and rules.
- G. Only "A" and "B" pens will be sold at Small Animal Auction.
- H. All Champion Market pens will be sold at Small Animal Auction.
- I. Showmanship rabbit must be registered under exhibitor's name and be exhibited under Breeding Rabbits or under Market Rabbits.
- J. Only the top 5 breeds in rabbit numbers will be eligible to receive awards.
- K. If your rabbit wins Best Of Breed you must put your rabbit back on table for Best Of Show judging.
- L. Should your rabbit win Best Of Show, Reserve Of Show, Grand Champion Roaster, Fryer or Homegrown, Reserve Champion Roaster, Fryer Pen or Homegrown; rabbit will be moved to a pen in the Champion area.

BARN RULES

- A. Exhibitors are responsible for care and feeding their own animals unless prior arrangements have been made in writing with a Rabbit Superintendent.
- B. No equipment, feed etc. shall be left in the Rabbit barn. Items left in barn will be disposed of.
- C. All feed and water containers are provided by the Rabbit Board and are signed out to exhibitors at time of check in, these are the only containers that will be allowed in rabbit barn, **there will be no exceptions to this rule.**
- D. All pens and trays shall be cleaned along with turning in all feed and water cups by 9:30 pm check-out time on the Saturday fair ends.
- E. Any exhibitor who removes their rabbit from Rabbit Barn without written approval by a Rabbit Superintendent will not be allowed to participate in any other remaining rabbit related activities for that Fair period, or run for small animal board.
- F. Chores must be completed by **10AM daily!!!**
- G. In addition to above they will also forfeit all winnings, this includes awards, premiums, ribbons etc. and will not be allowed a Fair rabbit project the following year.

- H. There will be a \$5.00 per exhibitor fee for barn improvements. This will be deducted from the exhibitors auction check, no matter what specie the exhibitor sells.
- I. Mandatory Auction set up on **Wed. July 29 at 4PM** for all sellers unless multiple Superintendents give written consent. Failure to attend will result in a \$25 check deduction.



HORSE & PONY RULES

GENERAL RULES:

- A. All entrants are subject to the rules and regulations of Michigan 4-H Youth Programs including Lenawee 4-H Horse and Pony Association regulations.
- B. Animals must be in place by 7:00 p.m., SATURDAY
- C. Superintendents have the right to rearrange classes and start times as needed.
- D. Register for all classes you are interested in showing. You will only be paid for three (3) classes. Class adds and drops will be allowed during fair.
- E. Superintendents have final decisions.

HORSES:

- F. All horses and ponies will be checked by a veterinarian on Saturday.
- G. Horse ages are determined as of January 1 of current year.
- H. Horse must be registered with superintendent by May 1 of current year.
- I. No stallions or yearling colts allowed.
- J. Horse and Ponies show together, except for Halter. Each horse/pony may be entered in only one model halter class.

EXHIBITORS:

- K. Exhibitor's age will be determined as of January 1 of current year.
- L. If any exhibitor leaves fair early, they will not be allowed to come to fair the following year, in the Light Horse Department.
- M. Youth working with horse project may enter an educational exhibit under division 10 class 189
- N. Group Showmanship must have 3 entries to participate. Exhibitors DO NOT HAVE TO BE IN THE SAME CLUB and DOES NOT COUNT TOWARDS YEAR END AWARDS.

O. Only the first and second place animals in respective classes are eligible to compete in championship classes. Exception, those exhibitors that are not eligible based on Horse and Pony Rules and Regulations.



DOG RULES

YOU WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO SHOW AT THE FAIR if the requirements are unfulfilled.

A. Exhibitors must submit a Dog Information Form along with proof of up-to-date immunizations to the 4-H office AT THE TIME OF FAIR REGISTRATION. The rabies vaccination is required by Federal Law and no medical exemptions are allowed. The distemper virus, parvovirus, and adenovirus (hepatitis) shots are considered core vaccinations. Proof of up-to-date immunizations can be met by the following:

1. A copy of veterinarian records showing that the rabies and the core vaccination are current. A titer test by a veterinarian showing an acceptable level of immunity is also admissible.
2. A copy of a rabies certificate from a veterinarian and owner records of core vaccinations which must include a copy of the label and when the shot was administered.
3. Exceptions to the core vaccinations requirement will be accepted in cases where a veterinarian certifies in writing that he or she does not recommend vaccines for a dog based on health reasons.

B. Puppies must be at least 6 months of age and have completed the series of DHLPP shots **or have an exemption letter from a veterinarian** in order to be eligible to show. If you do not own the dog you show, the owner's signature must be on the Dog information Form stating that you have permission from the owner to show the dog. You may use a choke collar or nylon choke in all classes except for agility. No pinch collars are to be used in any class. Obedience requires a six foot leather or solid fabric leash (no chain leashes).

C. To compete in agility, a dog must be at least one (1) year of age. This is for the health of the dog. A tag-free "buckle" collar **MUST** be used when competing in all agility classes.

D. Entry into the Advance Handling Class is mandatory for exhibitors that have placed first or second in two or more prior handling classes at previous Lenawee County Fairs.

E. An exhibitor can show up to two dogs in different

obedience, agility & rally classes.

F. Each exhibitor may only enter one costume class and one handling class with their dog.

G. The costume class is a fun event. There will be no specific theme and you must use your imagination.

H. Exhibitors with female dogs in season (in heat) will be allowed to show, but only at the end of their class.

Please notify the superintendent, that you have a female dog in season, before the dog show starts.

Female dogs in season must be kept away from the show area until you are ready to show.

I. Exhibitors may be excused from competition for the following reasons: Inability to control their dog; Interfering with other dogs or exhibitors; or, abusing their dog anywhere on the fairgrounds.

J. If an exhibitor has been excused from competition & has already shown, all ribbons, trophies, & premium money will be forfeited. Any screened (official) dog leader has the authority to tell any handler or exhibitor that their behavior is inappropriate. The superintendent must then be notified of the situation.

K. Each exhibitor must attend training sessions in order to show at fair. 7 Practices are required for first or second year exhibitor or showing in Agility Intermediate A (off leash) and 5 practices for 3 year and beyond and not showing in Agility Intermediate A (off leash). If an exhibitor uses more than one dog, each dog should be present at every other training session.

L. All Exhibitors showing in agility must also show in either obedience or rally.

DRESS CODE

The dress code is as follows:

- Any clothing or jewelry that draws undue attention to one's self or is distracting to other handlers & spectators, is unacceptable.
- Denim clothing of any color or kind is not acceptable.
- No clothing with club name, personal identification, logos, sayings, or other printed words will be allowed.
- Flat shoes, such as tennis shoes, should be worn by all exhibitors in all classes.
- **Handling - Recommended clothing includes dress slacks and no shorter than fingertip length skirts and dresses.**
- **Obedience & Agility - Dress slacks are highly recommended for all participants.**

EVALUATION & AWARDS

- 4-H rules (AKC obedience regulations annotated for Michigan 4-H Dog Care Project, parts 1 & 2) will be followed.
- Exhibitors showing dog(s) will also be evaluated on the grooming of their dog(s).
- In both obedience & agility, once a dog receives two qualifying scores, at a given level of achievement, the dog must advance to a higher level. The A & B classes of a given level of achievement are viewed together, as a single level. A qualifying obedience score is 170 points or more & qualifying agility score is 85 points or more. Once a dog has reached a given level of achievement, the dog may not show at a lower level, even with a different exhibitor. An exhibitor may return to a lower level with a different dog that has not previously achieved said level.
- Trophies will only be provided if the project members collect enough donations to cover the cost.
- To qualify for the Competitor Trophy, the exhibitor must enter an agility, handling, obedience, and rally class with the same dog. **The scores from each class will be added together.** The exhibitor with the highest combined score will receive the Top Competitor trophy.



CLASS LEVELS & SPLITS

Classes are split on each level by age. The superintendent(s) and/or judge(s) reserve the right to split, combine, or cancel classes as the need arises.

Class Levels:

- "A"- first year at that level.
- "B" A youth or dog who is exhibiting in that level additional years
- "C" is for all ages that have obtained the required number of qualifying scores but are not interested in moving to the next level which would require the dog to be off leash. All exhibitors participating in the C level classes **will receive placing ribbons but will not be eligible for the Top Competitor, Grand Champion, or Reserve Grand Champion trophies.**

When an exhibitor moves up to the next level, a class designated by "A" may be used again. Two qualify scores in pre-novice to enter into this class. Premium - ribbon only. Non qualification for the top competitor trophies.

6. For participation in designated club exhibits, a minimum of 5 members or 10% of the club's total membership, whichever is larger, must be involved in the work and identified on the project exhibit.
7. Only one exhibitor signs up for classes with group or club exhibits.
8. If an exhibitor is not able to be present for the interview, the project(s) may be brought for judging by another individual. Each project must be accompanied by a statement written/typed, video or audio file by the exhibitor outlining the reason that the exhibitor could not be present for the interview and a description of the project, how it was completed, what was learned, and any other pertinent information. It is strongly recommended that the exhibitor be present for the interview whenever possible.



DIVISION 1: PLANT & SOIL SCIENCE

RULES

Make an educational display utilizing models, equipment, displays, posters, digital display, etc.

CLASS

1. Demonstration or example of nontraditional plant growth techniques.
2. Soils - demonstration or experimentation with different soil types & soil amendments (i.e. soil testing, altering soil).
3. Plant Propagation – different techniques to starting a plant (including seed paper).
4. Weed & Insect Control – Home remedies to controlling weeds & insects. (i.e. Integrated Pest Management, etc.)

DIVISION 2: CROP SCIENCE

RULES

- A. Members completing last year's corn or bean project & enrolled in project again this year may exhibit last year's crop.
- B. No club entries permitted.
- C. **Identify crop and variety in each class.** Attach identification to exhibit on a 3"x5" card.
- D. Crops must be grown by exhibitor.
- E. Dried grains classes are not for first (1st) year exhibitors. Must have been enrolled in 4-H the previous year. Dried grains are considered to be popcorn & jarred grains.

CLASS

1. Corn: nine (9) ears exhibit.
2. Field corn: five (5) stalks, roots cleaned.
3. Popcorn: nine (9) ear exhibit.
4. Sweet corn (in season): five (5) ear exhibit in husk.
5. Soybean plants in bundle of ten (10), roots cleaned.
6. Hay: four (4) to six (6) inch wide flakes in clear plastic.
7. Straw: four (4) to six (6) inch wide flake in clear plastic.
8. Weed identification exhibit: selection of five (5) to ten (10) different common weeds, properly identified & displayed. Display can be photos taken by the exhibitor. First year project.
9. Weed Identification exhibit: selection of 15 to 20 different common weeds, properly identified and displayed. Display can be photos taken by the exhibitor or dried plants, second year and beyond.
10. Educational display: examples, poisonous weeds vs. edible weeds, soil identification tests & classification, crop science research information.
11. Crop records – from planting through harvesting (record of seed purchased, insecticides, herbicides, sale, etc.).
12. Grain Crops Project #1 Two one quart jars
13. Grain Crops Project #2 Two one quart jars
14. Grain Crops Project #3 Two one quart jars

DIVISION 3: VEGETABLE GARDENING

RULES

- A. Products exhibited must be planted, cared for, harvested, & selected for display by exhibitor.
- B. Crop and variety must be identified attached to exhibit on a 3"x5" card.
- C. Judging based on exhibition requirements: product, uniformity, quality, appropriate quantity, attractiveness, & knowledge of project (e.g. soil type & preparation, planting techniques, harvesting, etc.) in relation to years & experience in project. Suggested reference for selecting vegetables for exhibiting see bulletin **Selecting Vegetables for Exhibiting**, bulletin number 4-H 1175. Available at MSU Extension Office.
- D. Exhibitors are to furnish 9-inch white disposable plates for appropriate classes
- E. Group of three (3) 9-inch plates must be attached to a 6"x24" white covered wooden board or heavy cardboard.
- F. Box for displaying vegetables may be purchased at the MSU Extension Office.
- G. Exhibitors are to water live plants on Tuesday and Thursday of Fair Week.
- H. Exhibitors may replace vegetables during the week.

CLASS

1. One (1) 9-inch plate of one (1) kind of vegetable. (e.g. One (1) plate of Big Boy Tomatoes). This class is limited to first or second year in project.
2. Two 9" plates with 2 types of vegetables. Second year and beyond.
3. Three 9" plates with 3 types of vegetables. Second year and beyond.
4. One box or container of one type of vegetable.
5. One box or container of one type of vegetable.
6. One box or container of at least 6 but not more than 12 kinds of vegetables.

RULES

- A. Exhibit must be planted by, cared for, & selected by exhibitor.
- B. Herb name and variety must be attached on the exhibit with 3"x5" card.
- C. Exhibitors are to furnish their own container.

CLASS

1. Herb collection - poster (14"x22") or scrapbook.
2. Herbs – educational display illustrating herb plants & explanation of uses.
3. Herbs fresh – fresh cut or potted. 2nd year project & beyond. Plants must be identified. Minimum of three (3) different herbs.
4. Fresh cut or Potted 1 plant identified. 1st year only
5. Herbs dried – displayed attractively & identified. Minimum of three (3) varieties. 2nd year & up.



6. Dried Herbs, 1 variety, displayed attractively and identified. First year only.
7. Herb decorations & culinary products. Items made from herbs grown by exhibitor (e.g. potpourri, nosegay wreath, soap, etc.).
8. Herbs pressed – herbs displayed & identified.
9. Herb topiary – potted plant of individual design.

DIVISION 5: TREE PRODUCTS & FRUITS

RULES

- A. Exhibits must be planted by, cared for, & selected for display by exhibitor. Exception: tree fruits, may use an established tree planted by someone else, but must be cared for, harvested, & selected for exhibit by exhibitor.
- B. Variety & identification of produce must be on 3"x5" card attached to exhibit.
- C. Judging based on exhibiting requirements: product, quality, appropriate quantity, attractiveness, & knowledge of projects in relation to years of experience.
- D. Exhibitors are to furnish their own containers.

CLASS

1. Plate of five (5) fruits ,all one (1) variety.
2. Berries (e.g. raspberries, gooseberries, etc.) attractively displayed.
3. Nuts (e.g. walnuts, hickory, etc.) attractively displayed.
4. Suitable container, basket or plate of five (5) different varieties of one (1) fruit.
5. Fruit plant growing in a container
6. Fruit tree growing in a container
7. Nut plant growing in a container
8. Nut tree growing in a container
9. Syrup (Maple, hickory, etc.)
10. Other tree products (candy, sugar, etc.)

DIVISION 6: CREATIVE GARDENING

RULES

- A. Products exhibited must be planted, cared for, & selected for display by exhibitor.

CLASS

1. Creatively decorated vegetable or fruit. Exhibit only one (1) but may use others as part of decoration for total exhibit.
2. Unusual or ornamental vegetable.
3. Garbage or kitchen garden. Plants propagated from kitchen leftovers.
4. Useful article from fruit or vegetable.
5. Artistic seed design. Art must be in a frame (no glass), ready to hang, or an object self-supporting to sit on a shelf. No larger than 18"x36". Seeds do not need to be from plants that were cared for by exhibitor. Identify the types of seeds on a 3"x5" card. Seeds may be painted or dyed, no treated seeds.
6. One (1) straw bale garden. Exhibitor should identify the fruit(s) or vegetable(s) growing in the bale, including the

varieties, on a 3"x5" inch card attached to the project. If straw bale is too heavy, exhibitor may bring a record book display with photos and descriptions of the project.

DIVISION 7: ORNAMENTAL & DECORATED GOURDS

RULES

- A. Exhibit must be planted, cared for, & selected for display by exhibitor.

CLASS

1. Two (2) Lagenaria gourds grown by exhibitor this season.
2. Five (5) assorted ornamental gourds grown by exhibitor this season
3. One (1) unusual natural or hand trained gourd grown by exhibitor.
4. One (1) decorated dried gourd (e.g. painted, wood burned, carved, etc.). Gourd must be grown by exhibitor in previous growing season.
5. One (1) useful article made from dried gourd(s) (e.g. a bird house or feeder, musical instrument, etc.). Gourd must be grown by exhibitor in previous growing season.
6. One (1) creatively decorated gourd: may use other vegetables as part of the decoration and/or other accessories. Gourd may be fresh or grown by exhibitor in previous growing season.

DIVISION 8: SCARECROWS

RULES

- A. Scarecrow may be made from any material stuffed with straw, or fiber fill, etc.
- B. Scarecrow should have a face/head. No Halloween-type face masks. Recommended for face: any dried material (including dried gourd), cloth, milk jug, etc.
- C. Fabric may be used for clothing.
- D. May range in size from 2' to 3' OR 4' to 6'.
- E. SCARECROW MUST BE ABLE TO HANG ON WALL BY HOOK WITHOUT FALLING APART.
- F. NO FRESH PRODUCE OR FRUIT WILL BE ACCEPTED AS PART OF DISPLAY.

DIVISION 9: LANDSCAPE

RULES

- A. Individual or club entries permitted.
- B. Photos, sketches, models, or other forms of visual representation of work completed should not exceed a tri-fold board. Indication of scale of sketch, model, or drawing should be clearly indicated, as well as indication of direction (N.S.E.W.). (Normally the top of the sheet should represent the direction of North).



- C. Emphasis should be given to practical layouts, careful lettering, & graphic contrasts so the exhibit may be seen at a distance.

CLASS

1. Home grounds: individual entry depicting “before-during-completed” aspects of project. (Six (6) photo minimum).
2. Landscape design or drawing. Design or drawing will show a proposed plan that has not been completed. Hand drawn or CAD Designed
