Organic Vegetable Workshop at the Tollgate Center

The workshop organized in part by the Monroe Ag Educator took place early September (which is also National Organic Month) of 2024. It featured presentations for the organic vegetable grower on a selection of topics: weed control in high tunnels, disease management, produce safety, and an overview of farming practices employed at the Tollgate Center market garden. The event concluded with a tour of the center and a crop walk through the Tollgate center vegetable fields to discuss the farming practices used over the past summer. Evaluation feedback was positive, and attendees seemed happy with their experience. The event organizers plan for the Organic Vegetable Workshop to be a new tradition - an annual program that will gain in popularity, attendance, and impact as the years go on.

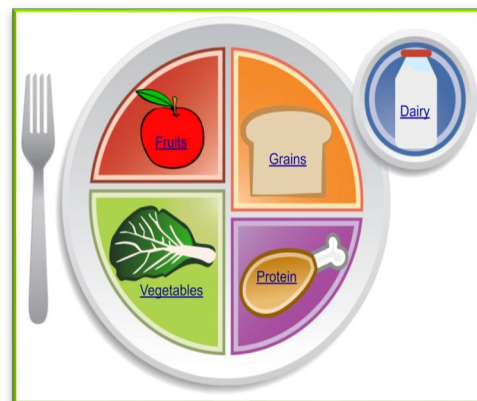


Agriculture Awareness Day

Agriculture Awareness Day is a staple in our community going on for over 30 years. After Covid participation dropped to 250 youth. These youth come from schools around the district to participate in a one day, station rotation where they learn about agriculture commodities, get exposed to 4-H and safety topics. In 2024, enrollment was 1300 youth. This great increase in attendance is largely due to extensive advertising and marketing to schools and the removal of previous fees. This gap in funds has been made up by collectively working with Farm Bureau and community partners to raise the funds in alternative formats.

Feeding your Picky Eaters

The Monroe County Head Start program encourages parent involvement with the school experience of their children. The Head Start program hosts parent meetings once a month throughout the county, where they invite families and caregivers to request topics they have an interest in. One of the biggest requests is always, Feeding Your Picky Eater. MSU Extension is invited to come and share tips and ideas that families can use and help navigate the challenges and joys of why children eat the way the do. In December MSUE was invited to share the Feeding Your Picky Eaters presentation at Monroe County ISD Parent meeting. During the presentation, one of the participants shared that last year, her daughter was enrolled in Head Start program and she attended the Feeding Your Picky Eater presentation and that the information she learned absolutely worked in her home! She now has a son in the program and wanted to attend this years meeting to share with the other parents how much things improved in her home and how it does work!

Embryology In the Classroom

In 2024, 4-H staff introduced a new egg incubation project. Young 5's-4th grade students fell in love with the eggs and later the chicks. Students monitored the eggs, learned how to candle the eggs, and eventually got to watch a video of them hatching! (hatched, they hatched at night without the kids around) After they hatched, they got to watch them grow for a week and learn all about chick care in their brooder. It was a wonderful way to connect with many 4-H member students as they were raising their own chicks at home for the fair and enjoyed comparing their growth.
