

This workshop goes more in depth on soil fertility and nutrient management. It is intended for people who already understand the basics. More details to come.




## Field Crops Update



**Soybean** harvest is well underway. Remaining soybeans are at R8 (harvest ready) and drying down. **Seed corn** harvest has been going strong and is starting to wrap up. Chopping of **silage corn** started last month and is ongoing. **Commercial corn** harvest will begin in earnest soon. Most corn has reached R6 (black layer) and is drying down. **Potato** harvest has made good progress with the dry weather, but it is constrained by high temperatures. Fall tillage and **winter wheat** and cover crop planting are underway. Many fall-sown cereals have emerged over the past two weeks in areas with sufficient moisture.


## Weather Update

Welcome rain fell the second-to-last weekend in September and continued into the last week of September. Since then, precipitation has been low in most areas of southwest Michigan, and daytime temperatures reached into the mid-80s. Nights have stayed cool. Rain forecast for the early middle of next week will bring a significant cooldown with it and some cloudy weather.
