

4-H Service Log





Hi! My name is Joe, and I'm going to guide you through 40 hours of community service.
Sounds like a TON doesn't it? Actually a lot more activities count as community service than I

originally thought. Figuring out what your community really needs is a part of service, and something that you'll be able to use to add up to your 40 hours. Being interviewed by the local paper about your project counts, too! So does the time you spend thinking about your project when it's over and recording things in your log book. Community service actually has five steps: assessing community needs, planning your project, doing the service, reflecting on what you did and celebrating! * With all these steps, before you know it, you're going to

have logged more hours than you know what to do with. And you thought you were going to have to do 20 canned goods drives to reach your 40 hours!

Why should I do 40 hours of service? Forty hours is the magic number required for you to receive a 4-H award for community service.

Remember that part of the 4-H pledge is "hands to larger service." Thousands of 4-H'ers are involved in 4-H every year and this is a

way to be recognized for your involvement!


Hold it! What if I don't like filling out record books? I, Joe, your handy-dandy helper,

have to admit this isn't the greatest task. However, maybe you've already noticed this record book, IS ONLY FOUR PAGES LONG! And I've gone ahead and done some examples for you, so no excuses. If you open the log book, you'll notice that it's broken up into enough space for you to do four projects. If it only takes you three projects to get to 40 hours, that's fine. If you need more pages, just make some copies of the ones that are included. The goal is to make this book work for vou.

What if I can't think of any projects other than walking my neighbor's dog? You're more creative than that aren't you? Well, to be

honest that's the only service project I could think of when I started thinking about being the star of your log book. A good thing they choose me for my good looks, and not for my knowledge of community service! However, I can fool anyone as a community service buff after discovering a HUGE list of projects.
