Member Completion Awards

Year-end awards are presented to 4-H members who actively participate in their club throughout the year. Criteria for receiving a completion award is determined by each individual club.

These awards can be presented to 4-H members in a variety of ways. Some clubs give out the awards at a 4-H Family Night so the parents are there to see their son/daughter recognized. This is also a great time to thank the 4-H project leaders. Other clubs have an end-of-the-year pizza party and give out the awards at that time. In some clubs, the teen leaders plan a 4-H awards party for the club.

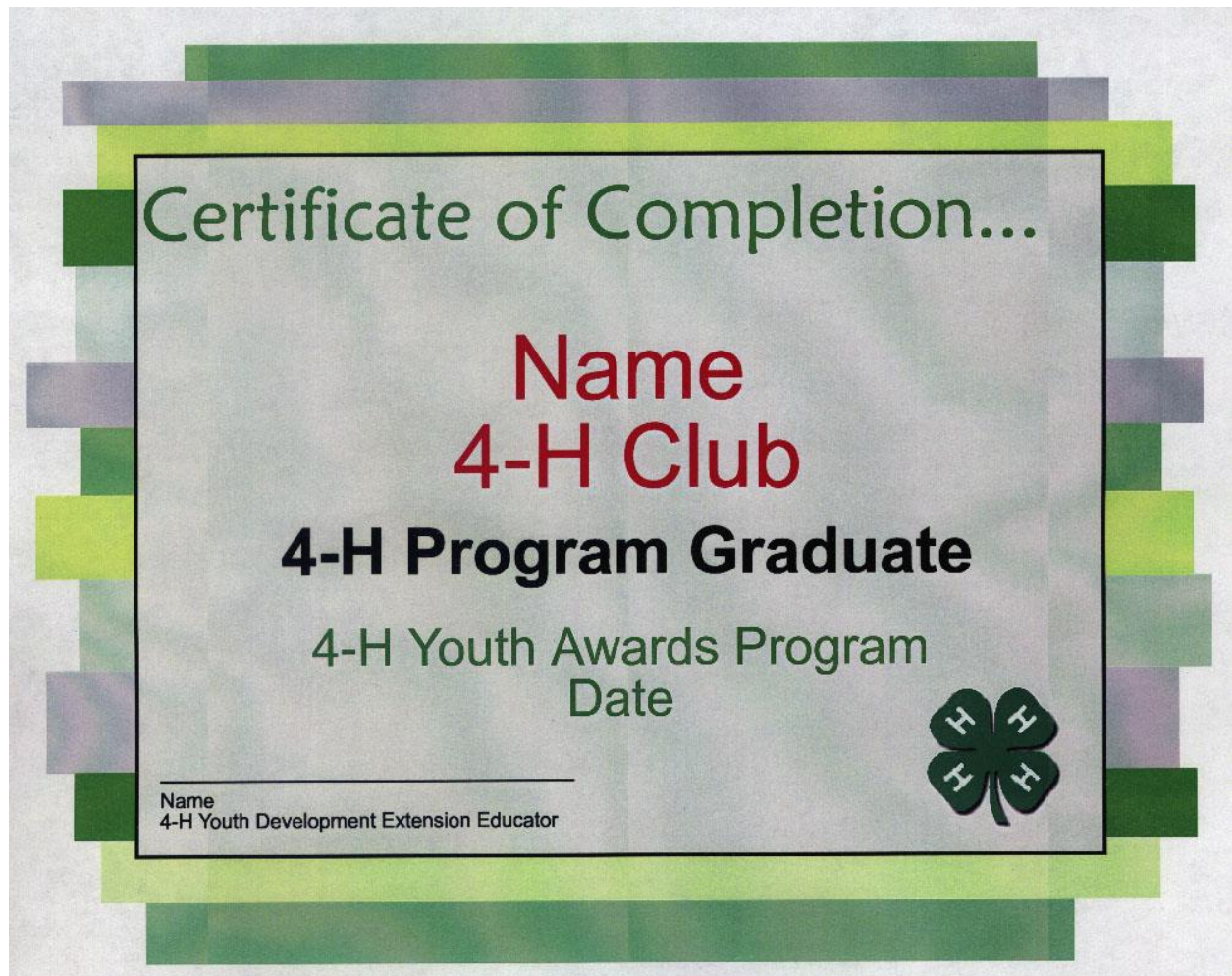

Teen Leader Awards

A Teen Leader is a 4-H member between the ages of 13-19 who has served in a leadership role in their local 4-H club and/or the county 4-H program and is registered as a teen leader and submitted by their Key Leader. Examples of teen leader activities include being a club officer and/or assisting a project leader.

First year teen leaders are presented with a “Teen Leader” pin during the Fall Youth Award Ceremony. All teen leaders also receive a certificate each year.



4-H Adult Leader Awards

Van Buren County 4-H Leaders are recognized for years of service (1st, 5th, 10th, etc.) at an annual 4-H Leaders Banquet held each fall. Leaders receive the following certificates and pins for each five years of service.

1 st Year -	Bronze Clover
5 th Year -	Silver Clover
10 th Year -	Gold Clover
15 th Year -	Pearl Clover
20 th Year -	Diamond Clover
25 th Year -	Emerald Clover

County Medals

Who Selects: Members from the community form the committee. They can be 4-H staff from other counties, school employees, or just ordinary citizens not directly or indirectly involved in Van Buren County 4-H. All names are taken off of the application and replaced with a number.

Award Definition: An award recognition is given to an individual who has made a specific accomplishment. In many program areas, the award is also an opportunity to learn. This adds a dimension of responsibility to the individual and to others. There are three important things to remember about awards:

1. It is an honor to receive an award. It is honorable to accept and carry out the responsibility of the award.
2. An award is recognition of things that you have achieved in the past. After you have received your award, you must set new goals for tomorrow.
3. Travel opportunities will give the member a chance to grow and to learn new skills.

Who is Eligible: Members must be actively enrolled in a 4-H club that is in good standing. The member must also be in good standing. Leaders and parents are encouraged to assume an active supporting role in helping the 4-H member complete their applications, but the work and applications are to be completed by the member. There may be specifics for each award.

- 4-H members may be nominated for a county medal by their project leader, key leader or may nominate themselves. All nominations must be sent to the key leader to review and approve.
- A 4-H member may not apply for more than seven county medals. The maximum of seven does not include Achievement, Leadership or Citizenship.

Requirements for County Medal Awards:

- Must be at least 12 years old by January 1 of current year
- Must have completed two years in the project
- Must not have previously received a County medal in that project area
- Application form must be completely filled out and signed by both the project leader and the key leader

County medals are not necessarily awarded to a member who received a trophy or best of show ribbon at the fair. A 4-H member does not need to exhibit at the fair to be considered for a county medal. Instead, this award is intended to honor the 4-H member who has actively participated in the project and was willing to assist others when help was needed.

The following are a few of the qualities 4-H leaders are asked to look for when nominating youth for a county medal:

- Actively participated in project
- Has a good attitude
- Worked to the best of their ability
- Willingness to help others

County Medals (cont.)

To be considered for a County Medal, the award nominee's score must be at 70% or above of the total points available.

Deadline: Check with your Key Leader

Applications may be acquired from Key Leaders, Project Leaders or from Michigan State University Extension. The member is responsible for completing the "4-H Award Application" (see sample in appendix) and obtaining the signatures of their project and key leaders.

The completed applications will be reviewed by the Awards Selection Committee. One or two 4-H members in each project may be selected to receive a county medal at the Awards Program. A 4-H member may not receive more than five county medals each year. This does not include Achievement, Leadership and Citizenship.

The following is a list of the categories that County Medals may be awarded in. If nominations are received for projects that are not listed below, the Awards Committee will decide if a county medal will be presented.

County Medals in Achievement, Leadership and Citizenship

Achievement

Takes personal initiative to go above and beyond 4-H project work.

Examples:

- An older member who takes what they learned in 4-H and starts a small business
- A member who receives recognition outside of 4-H for an outstanding accomplishment that resulted from their 4-H project work.

Leadership

Must be a teen leader for a minimum of 2 years.

Examples:

- Lead a 4-H project
- Be a 4-H club officer
- Chair a committee
- Assist in planning a county 4-H activity

Citizenship

Involved in a project to benefit others.

Examples:

- Organize a community beautification project. (i.e. Flower planting or trash pick-up along highway)
- Help plan a food drive
- Assist with an election

4-H Key Club Award

The 4-H Key Club award is presented to 4-H members from throughout Michigan. It recognizes youth who have actively participated in the 4-H program. The award is based on total points earned by participating in 4-H activities. Approximately two to five Key Club awards are presented each year. Selections will be made by the 4-H Awards Committee. The Key Club award is presented during the fall Youth Awards Ceremony and can be received one time per youth.

Requirements for the Key Club Award:

- Reached 15 years of age by the beginning of the Club year
- Completed 3 calendar years of club work as of January 1 of the current year.
- Completed 4-H projects in at least two project areas.
- Completed a Teen Leadership project.
- Participated in 3 district (state sponsored) and/or State 4-H events.

Deadline: Check with your Key Leader.

“I Dare You” Award

The “I Dare You” Award recognizes 4-H members for excellence in character, balanced personal development and leadership abilities. The award is sponsored by the American Youth Foundation. The award is presented to not more than two 4-H members per county each year. It is presented at the Fall Youth Awards Ceremony and can be received one time per youth. Selections are made by the 4-H Awards Committee.

Requirements for the “I Dare You” Award:

- Reached 16 years of age by October 1 of the current year
- Has completed five years in 4-H
- Has demonstrated leadership ability at the club level
- Has been active in 4-H and other youth programs (school, church, community, etc.)
- Has completed the 4-H Achievement Summary (see appendix)

Deadline: Check with your Key Leader

Outstanding 4-H Member

Selection Process: Applicable members must be 15-19 years old with a minimum of two completed years in the Van Buren County 4-H program. *(See sample application in appendix).*

Up to two youth will be awarded the honor of being the “Outstanding 4-H Member” each year. They must complete an application, which will follow with an interview. 4-H members are selected based on 4-H involvement, leadership qualities, community service initiatives and evidence of a citizenship commitment. The well-rounded individuals in the 4-H program, school, community and/or youth groups will be the best candidates.

Term of Duty: Outstanding 4-H Members” serve from October through the September following the 4-H Leaders’ & Youth Awards.

Each member chosen at the “Outstanding 4-H Member” shall receive a sweatshirt, two t-shirts and a name badge.

Chaperone: A 4-H volunteer must be present with the “Outstanding 4-H Member” at all events they participate in.

Duties and Responsibilities: When awarded this role, members will be expected to represent 4-H throughout the year at various community events such as the Van Buren Youth Fair, parades and media requests, as well as any other venues that promote 4-H. The Outstanding 4-Her has been fairly self-guided, this is a leadership role.

Members are requested to complete the following:

- Participate in a parade representing 4-H
- Attend a community service organization meeting to promote 4-H
- Attend as many Van Buren County 4-H Leaders’ Association meetings as possible (Meetings are the 3rd Monday of each month at 7 p.m. No meeting in July or December)
- Attend a 4-H clubs meeting that is not their own
- Attend a board of commissioners meeting
- Be interviewed on a radio show to promote 4-H or the fair
- Submit a letter to the editor or write an article in a local newspaper promoting 4-H*
- Attend a county committee meeting (LLC, SMAC, DAC, Horse Council)
- Perform duties at the Van Buren Youth Fair AND complete a still exhibit to promote what you have completed as "Outstanding 4-H Member"
- Go to a community event and promote 4-H
- Talk to a state representative, legislature or government or attend a local township meeting
- Promote National 4-H week to others
- Assist during the Van Buren County 4-H Youth Awards and Ceremony and promote your experiences through a speech.

Outstanding 4-H Member (cont.)

A sample schedule of duties may include, but not limited to with variance in schedule:

October: Promote National 4-H week to others

November: Talk to State Representatives, legislature or government or attend a local township meeting

December: Participation in a holiday parade representing 4-H

January: Attending a service organization meeting to promote 4-H

February: Attend a 4-H club meeting, not their own

March: Attend a County Board of Commissioners meeting

April: Be interviewed on a radio show to promote 4-H

May: Submit a letter to the editor or write an article in a local newspaper promoting 4-H*

June: Attend a county committee meeting (4-H Leaders' Association, LLC, Horse Council, SMAC)

July: Perform duties during the Van Buren Youth Fair

August: Submit a letter to the editor or write an article in a local newspaper promoting 4-H*

September: Assist at the Van Buren County 4-H Leaders and Youth Awards

*Topics to be written or talked about are selected by the youth with assistance from the 4-H Youth Development Extension Educator to ensure appropriate materials.

Club Officers

Club officers play a key role in the function of a 4-H club. It is a great responsibility and commitment and these individuals will be recognized at the 4-H Youth Awards with a certificate.

Michigan 4-H Awards Program

All 4-H members, ages 13-19, are eligible to apply for a State Award in the category of their choice.

A 4-H State Award is the highest honor bestowed on a Michigan 4-H member. 4-H State Award winners become part of an elite group of 4-H youth who have demonstrated the highest level of excellence in learning, leadership, and service. The purpose of this awards program is to provide 4-H youth a learning opportunity where they can receive recognition while developing important life skills. Through the experience, members apply skills in communication, organization, and self-motivation.

A select number of 4-H State Award applicants are invited to attend the prestigious 4-H State Award Recognition Event held during 4-H Exploration Days as State Award delegates. 4-H State Award delegates are selected through an application process that showcases their knowledge, skills and experiences in their chosen 4-H project area. Participation in the State Awards Program helps all applicants develop workforce preparation skills such as communication, time management, goal setting, and record keeping.

Recognition for 4-H State Award winners include a plaque and cash award. The program recognizes 4-H members in 19 project areas in both junior (13-15 years old) and senior (16-19 years old) age divisions, as well as a group award area (13-19 years old).

Mark of Excellence

The 4-H Mark of Excellence Award is a division of the 4-H State Awards Program for 11 and 12-year-old 4-H members.

To enter, a 4-H member writes an essay on the theme, "Because of 4-H I can ...". Essays are submitted to the local county MSU Extension office by February 1. County 4-H programs then select up to two youths' essays as their representatives and submit those names and essays to the State 4-H Awards Committee.

Section Two

4-H Program Opportunities

An Excellent Adventure

An Excellent Adventure is an all day educational program designed for 4-Her's 9-12 years of age by January 1 of the current year. Hands-on sessions are taught by volunteer 4-H adult and teen leaders and MSU Extension staff members.



Camp Kidwell

Camp Kidwell is a 4-H sponsored camp located on Eagle Lake near Bloomingdale. It is a wonderful camp that offers day-camp for younger campers and full-week camping experiences for older campers. Campers stay in heated cabins, enjoy archery, canoeing, hiking, horseback riding, sports, swimming, and campfire fun.

Capitol Experience

Capitol Experience is a 4-H program for members in Freshman-Senior high school years. If selected, the member will travel to Lansing, staying in a hotel for the 3-½ day intensive workshop on Michigan government. Members have the opportunity to meet and spend time with their local legislators, as well as tour several government-based agencies. Members select an area of interest to follow throughout the workshop and job-shadow a mentor for one day.



Citizenship Washington Focus (CWF)

Citizenship Washington Focus consists of a one-week trip to Washington, D.C. for 4-H members ages 15-19. Participants will explore government and youth issues through educational field trips, learning games, and active discussions.

Participants stay at the National 4-H Center in Chevy Chase, Maryland, with program highlights including the Washington D.C. metropolitan area (Capitol Hill, Smithsonian Institute, Arlington National Cemetery, Kennedy Center, and Washington National Cathedral) and historic Gettysburg, Pennsylvania. Participants must be aged 15-19 and have been in 4-H for two years.

Exploration Days

4-H Exploration Days is an annual state youth conference attracting nearly 3,000 youth participants and chaperones to MSU in June. Participants stay and eat in the dorms at MSU; they travel on specially arranged buses across campus to attend educational workshops. Members can take advantage of the pool and sporting facilities on campus, as well as attend a dance for participants. The highlight of Exploration Days is the State Award announcements. Participants must be 12 years of age by January 1 of the current year to attend.



Foreign Exchange Programs

The 4-H experience offers opportunities for foreign exchange with a variety of countries. Members usually travel to foreign countries for a one-month period in the summer and stay with host families. Families also have the option of hosting a foreign exchange student in their home for one to two months, or longer, depending on which program is chosen.



Great Lakes Natural Resources Camp

The Great Lakes Natural Resources Camp is a six-day camping experience held in August at Camp Chicagami in Presque Isle, Michigan. This camp is unique from other general camps in that it focuses on the natural resources of Michigan and the understanding of related careers, such as marine biology. In addition to the general camping activities, campers also can take part in fishing, snorkeling, sailing, bird watching, lighthouse tours, and community service projects. Participants learn about wildlife/forestry, Great Lakes coasts, charter fishing, geology, and lakes and wetlands.

Kettunen Center Training Workshops

The Michigan 4-H program has its own training facility, Kettunen Center, in Tustin, Michigan, near Cadillac. It is a marvelous facility located in the woods with regular buildings that serve as dorms and training facilities. Members and project leaders can attend weekend workshops at the Kettunen Center with costs varying per program. In the past, subject areas have included:

National Congress



4-H National Congress takes place in November annually in Atlanta, Georgia. Selected participants fly into Atlanta and partake in a wonderful, weeklong conference including workshops, activities, and formal dinners. National Congress is a wonderful opportunity to meet and network with 4-H members from across the country, sharing project ideas and camaraderie.

State to State Exchange

Participants travel to another state or they host youth from another state. In the past, 4-H youth from Michigan have hosted 4-H members from Minnesota and Pennsylvania. Van Buren County youth have traveled to Hawaii and San Francisco.



Van Buren Youth Camp

Van Buren Youth Camp is a camp located near Bloomingdale. It is a wonderful camp that offers day camp for younger campers and full-week camping experiences for older campers. Campers stay in cabins and enjoy archery, canoeing, hiking, horseback riding, sports, swimming, games, skits, folk dancing, singing and campfire fun.

Van Buren Youth Fair

The Van Buren Youth Fair is held in July at the fairgrounds in Hartford. This is an event where participants receive ratings and premiums for their submitted projects.



Section Three

4-H Event Scholarships

4-H Event Scholarships

The 4-H Leaders' Association is an organization that includes representatives from all 4-H clubs in Van Buren County. One of the goals of the Leaders' Association is to make it possible for members and leaders to attend 4-H events by offering financial scholarships.

Funding for these scholarships are made possible through 4-H fundraising efforts, in addition, to donations received from local organizations and individuals. A family must participate in the countywide fundraiser for the 4-H members and volunteers from that family to be eligible for scholarships through the Leaders' Association.

You must be a registered active 4-H member/leader to be eligible for scholarships.

Scholarships are available for the following 4-H programs and events:

- Camp Kidwell
- Capitol Experience*
- Citizenship Washington Focus*
- Exploration Days
- Great Lakes Natural Resource Camp
- National Congress*
- Van Buren Youth Camp
- 4-H Adult & Teen Leader Workshops (*Application is on line or available at the Extension office. To be considered, application must be complete and turned into the Leaders' Association. Consideration will be made at a regular business meeting.*)

In addition, the 4-H Leaders Association subsidizes An Excellent Adventure and 4-H Volunteer and Youth Awards. As new programs and events become available, additional scholarships will be considered by the 4-H Leaders Association.

Your support of fundraising efforts is very important as the 4-H program in Van Buren County continues to grow!

*Must be 4-H members for 2 years.

The selection process for the positions available for the Citizenship Washington Focus program is as follows:

1. Applications forms will be sent to all eligible 4-H members.
2. 4-H members must complete the CWF application, provide written responses to the questions and submit to the Extension Office by deadline with deposit.
3. All applicants meet with an interview panel for a brief interview.
4. Based on the application and interview, 4-H members will be selected to attend the Citizenship Washington Focus trip.

Section Four

4-H College Scholarships

4-H College Scholarships

Criteria for selection of state and national 4-H scholarships:

- Outstanding achievement in 4-H
- Broad range of 4-H experiences and project involvement
- 4-H involvement in local, county, regional, state and national levels
- Leadership and citizenship contributions both inside and outside 4-H
- Number of years in 4-H
- Thoroughness in completing application requirements
- Neatness of application
- Scholastic excellence
- Financial need (applies to only selected scholarships)

Note: The following information is subject to change. Contact the Extension Office for current guidelines and application forms.

Van Buren County 4-H Scholarship

The Van Buren County 4-H Leaders Association offers four college scholarships (\$1000.00 each) to Van Buren 4-H members.

Eligibility:

- Youth must be a current high school senior, college freshman, sophomore, junior, or senior or graduate student.
- All applicants must be a current 4-H member.
- A person may not receive this award, more than twice.

Check with your Key Leader for deadline.

Van Buren County Large Livestock Scholarship

The Van Buren Youth Fair Large Livestock Scholarship is available to a student attending the first year of college and/or an institution of higher learning who can meet the following requirements:

- Must be a graduating senior in high school becoming a first year student in college or a first year student in a higher education program.
- Must be active the last three (3) consecutive years in large livestock projects at the Van Buren Youth Fair.

State 4-H Scholarships

Michigan State University 4-H Scholarship

4-H members who are high school seniors must apply to MSU and submit the MSU 4-H Scholarship Application by November 1 of their senior year. Applicants must meet the standard admissions requirements of the university and be accepted to MSU.

\$2,500 annually for four consecutive years of full-time study at MSU. A minimum of four scholarships are given annually.

Michigan State University - Michigan 4-H Foundation Scholarships

The Michigan 4-H Foundation offers scholarships to attend Michigan State University. There is no separate application process for these awards scholarships – recipients are selected from the MSU 4-H Scholarship applicant pool above. Current scholarships include:

Sigma Alpha Sorority 4-H Scholarship

Award amount: \$1,000

Lowell and Carol Spike Memorial 4-H Scholarship

Award amount: \$1,000

Michigan Rabbit Scholarship

Current 4-H members who will be enrolled in higher education, which includes community college, university, or trade school. Students must have been enrolled in a 4-H rabbit or cavy project for at least three years.

\$500 per scholarship, up to four scholarships are given annually

Pre-College Scholarship

Students in 8th, 9th or 10th grade following their MSU pre-college program involvement (such as 4-H Exploration Days, 4-H Great Lakes & Natural Resources Camp, 4-H Renewal Energy Camp, 4-H Animal & Veterinary Science Camp or 4-H Capitol Experience). 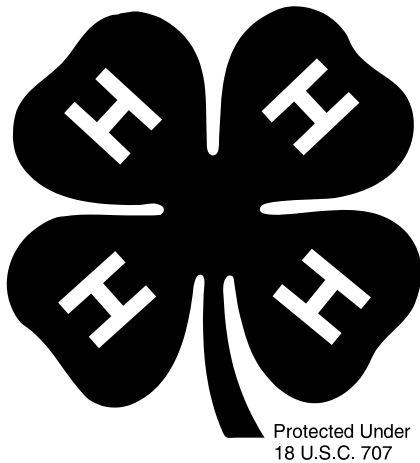
