Garden to Table Summer Workshop Series

In this hands-on program, youth will explore the journey of food from seed to plate! Participants will learn how to plant and care for a garden, harvest fresh produce, and turn their homegrown ingredients into simple, healthy meals. Activities promote teamwork, environmental awareness, and healthy living through fun and engaging gardening and cooking experiences.

- **7/25, 4-5:30pm:** Harvest & Snack! Participants will explore how to identify when produce is ripe and ready to harvest. They'll pick garden-grown fruits and vegetables, learn about their nutritional value, and prepare a simple meal.

Volunteer Spotlight- Melissa Rinke

Where do you volunteer, and how did you get started?

Success Story

Livestock Clinic Brings 4-H Members Together to Learn and Grow

The Wayne County 4-H Livestock Clinic is an educational event designed to prepare youth for success in livestock projects and exhibitions. Open to all 4-H members, the clinic provides handson learning opportunities with a focus on animal care, showmanship, and industry best practices. Youth participants engage with experienced presenters and industry professionals to gain valuable knowledge on topics such as feeding and nutrition, grooming, animal health, and proper handling techniques.

The clinic offers species-specific sessions, including beef, swine, goats, rabbits/cavy, and poultry, ensuring youth receive targeted instruction relevant to their project animals. In addition to hands-on skill-building, youth practice show ring etiquette and receive feedback to help build their confidence and abilities ahead of fair season.

Now in its third year, the Wayne County 4-H Livestock Clinic has continued to grow in size, scope, and impact, serving as a key educational opportunity for youth engaged in livestock projects. What began as a single-day clinic has evolved into a two-day event, with small animal sessions held Friday evening and large animal programming offered all day Saturday, May 16-17, 2025, at the Wayne County Fairgrounds. This expanded format allowed for deeper learning and better scheduling for families and volunteers.

In 2025, 40 youth participated, up from 26 in 2024, marking a 54% increase in attendance. Participants ranged in experience levels, from first-year members to seasoned showmen, and they engaged in both species-specific sessions and broader livestock project workshops. This year's clinic included: showmanship sessions for beef, dairy, swine, goats, rabbits/cavies, and poultry. As well as educational classes on breed and market classes, nutrition and illness, halter breaking and training, animal first aid, and marketing your 4-H project.

Participants were excited, engaged, and eager to apply the knowledge they had learned. One youth, after attending the Marketing Your 4-H Project session, shared, "This was my second favorite class, pigs were my first. It's hard to beat pigs." Another noted, "I didn't know there were different ways to talk to buyers. I feel more confident now that I know how to explain my project." When asked what they enjoyed most about the clinic, one participant enthusiastically responded, "The hands-on aspect! Having the opportunity to touch and interact with the small animals was awesome." This sentiment reflects the clinic's commitment to experiential learning, providing youth with genuine opportunities to connect with animals and develop practical skills through direct interaction.

The impact of the clinic extended beyond the youth as well, thanks to a committed team of more than 10 volunteers and MSU Extension staff, who contributed nearly 100 combined hours to planning, preparing, and leading the sessions. Their dedication ensured a high-quality experience, and their presence helped model leadership, teamwork, and knowledge-sharing. Additionally, the clinic received financial support from the Michigan Farm Bureau 4-H Excellence in Agriculture Grant, awarded to Wayne County volunteer Donna Budd in 2024. This funding allowed for the addition of new sessions and supplies as well as covered the cost of clinicians, ultimately enriching the overall program experience for youth. Each year, the clinic continues to grow "bigger and better," proving its value in developing the next generation of livestock leaders and ag-savvy youth in Wayne County. With strong volunteer support, grant funding, and a commitment to excellence, the clinic stands as a shining example of what's possible through the 4-H program in Wayne County.

Register for the Michigan 4-H and FFA State Livestock Judging Contest

Registration is now open for the Michigan 4-H and FFA State Livestock Judging Contest! Participants can demonstrate their livestock evaluation and selection skills, as well as improve their communication and decision-making skills at this fun statewide contest. The day will include both individual and team competition with classes of beef cattle, Boer goats, sheep and swine.

Contest divisions include:

- 4-H Juniors 4-H youth ages 8-13 as of January 1
- 4-H Seniors 4-H youth ages 14-19 as of January 1
- FFA Junior High FFA members that recently completed seventh or eighth grade
- FFA High School FFA members that recently completed grades 9-12
- MLE Youth ages 8-21 as of January 1 that are competing in the Michigan Livestock Expo but are not a member of 4-H or FFA
- Cloverbuds 4-H youth age 7 as of January 1, non-competitive



While the dates for the contest no longer coincide with Michigan Livestock Expo (MLE), this contest does still count as an educational experience for the MLE Premiere Stockman Award!.
